### Fight "Flu" Now, Health Head Urges

Only Slight Recurrence of Epidemic Expected if Precautions Are Taken, Dr. Edwards Says.

Omaha has been exceptionally favored this summer by conditions which promote good health, but this situation may not prevent a mild recurrence of flu, according to Dr. J. F. Edwards, health commissioner.

The doctor is not predicting a recurrence, but states that the history of flu epidemics shows recurrences of decreasing severity during a period of several years.

The health commissioner has sent to a printer the copy of the first issue of a monthly bulletin which will be issued by his department. The caption of the first issue will be "Infectious Disease Number."

Dr. Edwards advises Omahans to observe the known rules of health, particularly those which were emphasized during the flu epidemic two years ago.

All Must Be Careful. The commissioner calls attention to the spread of disease by germs given off in the nose and throat discharges, this spread being caused largely by personal contact. He explains that health departments are requiring reports of such cases, and by tracing the sources of infection and blocking their routes and by bringing known cases and carriers under supervision we have accomplished much in the way of prevention, but one realizes more than the health officer how much depends upon the people themselves.

The health commissioner again advises against the indiscriminate use of drinking cups and eating utensils. The following rules are urged by the health commissioner:

Wash your hands and keep them away from your nose and mouth as much as possible.

Get away from the vicinity of the person who coughs or sneezes without covering it up.

Do not stand too closely in front of the person you are talking with, especially one who indulges in forcible and moist conversation.

Avoid crowds and insist on good ventilation in your place of employment as well as your home.

Patronize only eating places, soda fountains and soft drink parlors that are at least clean and neat in appearance.

Use straws for your sodas or soft drinks.

Use your napkin if you suspect your knife, spoon or fork.

### Boy Describes How Parents Beat His Small Brother to Death

Defiance, O., Sept. 8.—The spectacle of a foster father weeping while a seven-year-old boy was describing how the parents, alleged to have beaten the boy's three-year-old brother to death with a heavy harness tug, greeted the jury members in the trial of Joshua Botkin, farmer, here.

Botkin is on trial for first degree murder following the death of Arthur Bullock, child of his housekeeper, on the night of July 8. The prosecution, which closed its case, sought to prove that Botkin held the child by the ankles and beat him with the tug while holding his head in a tub of water to stifle his screams.

During the testimony of Earl Wesley Botkins, the seven-year-old boy, Botkins wept bitterly. When the boy approached the witness stand he showed fear and it was necessary several times to assure him that he would not be harmed.

### Liquor Is Divorced Entirely From U. S. Navy

Washington, Sept. 8.—Spiritous liquors received their final and complete divorce from the United States navy in an order made public today by the bureau of medicine and surgery, prohibiting their issue to naval vessels for medicinal purposes.

Not only are medical supply depots prohibited issuing whiskey except to hospitals, but when their present supplies have become exhausted, the order states, "no further purchases will be made and whiskey will be stricken from the supply table of the medical department of the navy."

It is estimated that the supply on hand will last not more than two or three weeks.

The order directs that no further purchases from any source be made of "distilled spirits, wines or alcohol preparations which are designated by the bureau of internal revenue as being fit for intoxicating beverage purposes."

### Revolt Against Soviets Rule Breaks Out at Moscow

London, Sept. 8.—Several serious revolts against the Russian soviet government have broken out in the neighborhood of Moscow, and have been suppressed with much bloodshed, says a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company, filed in Copenhagen yesterday. It quotes telegrams received in that city from Riga.

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 8.—Pitcher Tom Sheehan of the Atlanta Southern association baseball club has been sold to the New York Americans and will join that club at the close of the association season.

### School Enrollment Here Nearly 30,000 First Day

The total enrollment of all the Omaha public schools on the opening day Tuesday, was 27,402. Superintendent of Schools John Beveridge announced today. This makes an increase of 950 over the enrollment last year, which totalled 26,652.

There were 1,993 students enrolled at Central High school, 710 at Commerce High, 605 at South High and 89 at Benson High. The heaviest enrollments at the elementary schools were: Lathrop, 880; Kellow, 864; Lake, 858; Long, 846, and 827 at Mason.

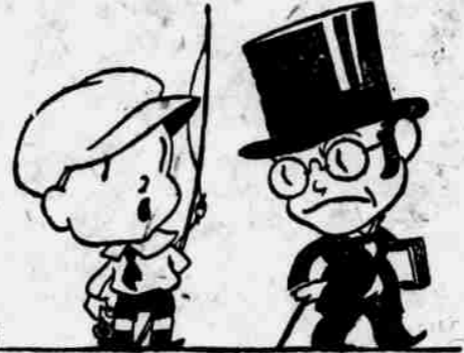
