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Withdraws From Race In Michigan Election

Flint, Mich., Sept. 8.—Asserting that he was not accustomed to "political ways, means and methods," and had neither the time nor money to make a campaign, Lieut. Col. Guy M. Wilson of Flint formally notified the secretary of state of his withdrawal as democratic nominee for lieutenant governor of Michigan.

In his letter, Colonel Wilson wrote: "The method practiced in Michigan in the last few years in relation to money and promises made for political patronage is such that I cannot follow. I am not a wealthy man and, therefore, it seems the desire for political aspirations is closed in Michigan to a man of moderate means."
