Ingolsbee again layed back to the three-quarters when he pulled around the field, coming down on the outside and winning easily. Case made a strong bid to split the affair again in the fourth heat. As in the two preceding miles, Ingolsbee took things easy for the first three-quarters, but when he started his drive at the three-quarters, Case was right at his tail with Tibbatts. The two raced neck and neck through the stretch, Ingolsbee winning by half a length at the finish.

### Speed to Spare.

Alison Dillon, a bay mare by Alton, driven by Al Whitney, had the speed of the bunch in the 2:14 trot, the second race on the card, and at no time was the former buggy mare in any danger. This mare has a mark of 2:06 1/4 and could easily have made the track at that clip. Mahara, another Peterson entry, straggled out in front at the word, but Whitney sailed to the front on the back stretch, and won easily in 2:10 1/4.

The mare led over the entire route the second and third heats, with the main fight for second place. Sammy R., a bay stallion by Elastic King, trotted by Fred Kane, was second in the second heat, and Checkers, a gelding son of The Exponent, driven by Ed Allen, got second in the third and deciding heat.

"Goldenrod," 3-year-old trot, raced on the third heat plan, brought out a good field of five youngsters with Maxey Beut, owned by Otis M. Smith, and driven by Roy Owen, in the guide position the first heat. A blanket would have covered the field all the way. Maxey went to a break at the three-eighths pole, letting Fayette National, a sweet going son of San Francisco, dam by a son of Wilgins, through for first place in 2:13 1/4.

Spits Race Up.  
Binquita, a grey gelding by Binjola, looked as though he would be a contender by the time the field was around to the half in the second heat, but Marie Cecil Watts, came on fast the last quarter, winning the heat with Maxey Beut in second place, and Fayette National third. The time was 2:14 1/4.

Marie Cecil Watts took the field away in the third heat, which furnished the hottest finish of the race. Binquita came on fast in the last eighth, in close to the pole, and would have won had there been room for him to get through next the rail. As it was, he finished third, with Maxey Beut in second place on the outside.

Four youngsters answered the bell for the first heat of the "Corn Husker," 3-year-old pace. Lady Mary was leading at the quarter, but Miss Jennie E. has taken the front place at the half. Positions changed again in the stretch, Lady Mary coming up in a flash of speed and winning in a hard drive.

### Takes Third Heat.

Two pacers were ahead of the pole horse when the field got the word in the second heat. Miss Jennie E. went to the front early in the mile, winning the heat in 2:14 1/4. Little Patch, who had shown lameness during the first heat, went to a bad break, finishing way back, quite lame, and was drawn.

Lady Mary went to the front in the third heat, with the field strung out in parade fashion at the quarter. The daughter of Miss Mary was never headed, winning the heat without any particular trouble. 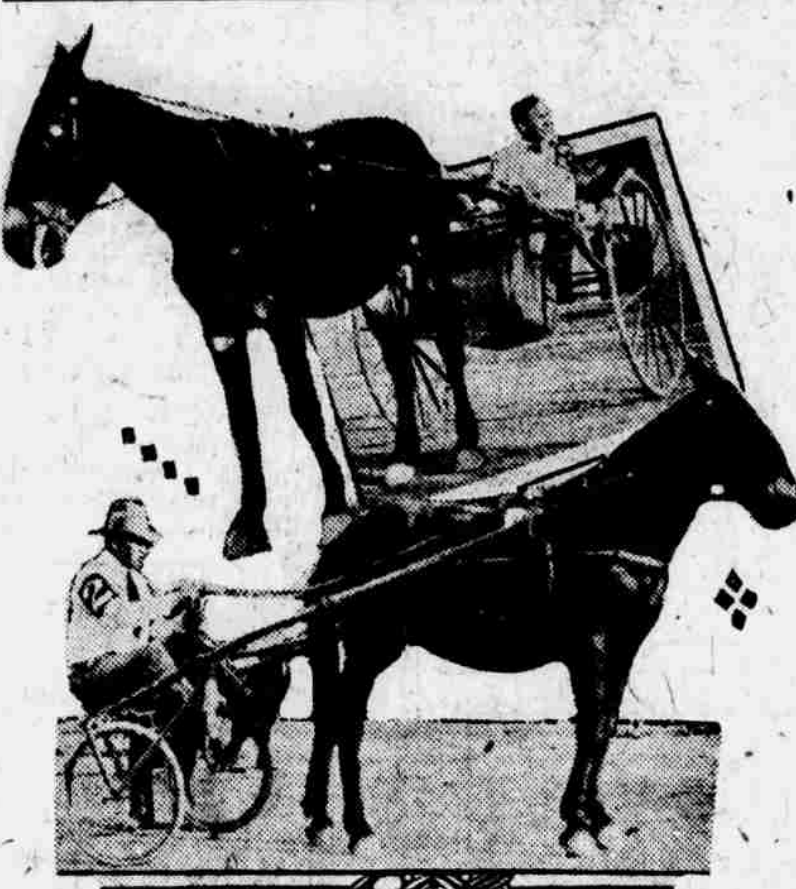

## Dodgers Look Like National League Winners

Cincinnati Reds and New York Giants Only Other Clubs Remaining in Race For Pennant.

New York, Sept. 15.—Unless all base ball dopsters are wrong it looks today as if the Brooklyn team will be the National league contender in this fall's world's series. While the club so ably directed by "Uncle" Wilbur Robinson is not yet mathematically sure of the National league pennant, the percentage figures make it look a moral certainty. Only two clubs are left to challenge the Brooklyn's present lead of five games over the Cincinnati Reds and the New York Giants. The Giants apparently passed out as possibilities when the St. Louis Cardinals defeated them. It would now be necessary for the Giants to win 15 of their remaining 17 games to tie Brooklyn should the latter win only seven or about half of its remaining games. The Brooklyn team is in the position of being forced to win three straight to have a look in, and after they get through with Brooklyn they must meet the Giants in four contests. It looks like an insurmountable obstacle, even for Pat Moran.

The defeat of the White Sox and Cleveland team combined with the brilliant trouncing of the Detroit Tigers by the Yankees gives the Yankees the lead in the American league pennant race and makes exceedingly probable a greater New York world series contest between Brooklyn and New York.

As for the Reds, they have almost as difficult a road as the Giants. They still have 20 games to play. In case Brooklyn wins only seven of its remaining 13 games, it will be necessary for Cincinnati to win 14 of the 20 to tie the Reds. The Reds are in the position of being forced to win three straight to have a look in, and after they get through with Brooklyn they must meet the Giants in four contests. It looks like an insurmountable obstacle, even for Pat Moran.

President Heydler of the National league announced that the following games will be played by the three National league contenders from now till the close of the season: Brooklyn, with Chicago, one; Cincinnati, three; Pittsburgh, two; Boston, two; New York, five. Total, 13. Cincinnati, with Philadelphia, one; Brooklyn, three; New York, four; Pittsburgh, nine; Chicago, two; St. Louis, one. Total, 20.
