His Double, Followed by Single and Bunt in Eleventh Inning, Give New York the Game.

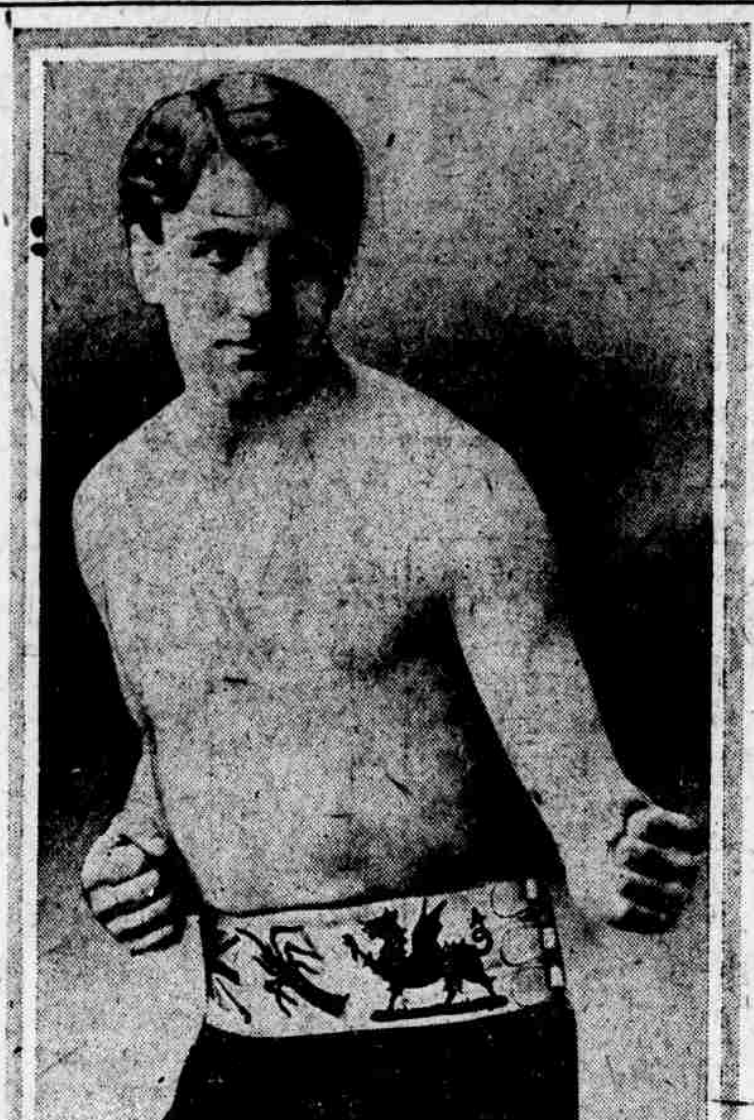
