Seven Chicago Players Involved in Evidence Presented To Grand Jury, Prosecutor Replogle Says.

Chicago. Sept. 23.—Evidence that the world's series last year between the Chicago American and Cincinnati National clubs was "not on the square" was presented to the Cook county grand jury which yesterday began an investigation of alleged base ball gambling, according to a statement issued yesterday by Hartley Replegie, prosecutor in charge of the investigation.

Seven Chicago players are involved, Mr. Replogie said, but none of the Cincinnati players were implicated. He charged in his statement, however, that some of the witnesses were not living up to their pledges that they would make pub-lic all the information they had,




