



Granting Credit

Secretary of Treasury Condemns Proposals to Withhold Goods From Market For Higher Prices.

Washington, Sept. 27 .- Secretary of the Treasury Houston asserted today that he is unalterably opposed to extension of credit to enable pro-ducers to withhold heir goods from he market until higher prices can be obtained. Agricultural interests, notably the southern cotton planters and western stockmen, have been seeking such extensions of credit

through the federal reserve board.
"I am in favor," said Secretary
Houston, "of every legitimate efforto promote the orderly marketing of all commodities, but the government cannot be a party to an undertaking to hold commodities off the market to enable the owners artificially, for speculative purposes, to maintain war prices or higher than war prices. "As a matter of fact, the banks of the country during the last 12 months have been extending large credits to meet the demands from industry and agriculture. Since August, 1919, the loans and investments of about 800 reporting member banks increased over \$2,500,000,000. As these reporting banks represent about 40 per cent of the resources of all the banks, it is estimated that the total increase in loans and invest-ments since August, 1919, has been over \$5,500,000,000.
