Slow.

Enters New Field.

Now that the falling price movement has made headway in fields untouched in the break of last spring, the markets are in a position to take account of what has gone by and what lies ahead. It is possible that the course of the sicel market will be an important guiding influence for business and trade generally. In the light of the broad impression of the last fortinght that most quotations for goods were headed downward for some time to come, Judge Gary's "Hope that the increased freight rates will not cause the corporations to advance prices," brings forward something for business to think about. The corporation's base price, in effect since March of last year, is \$10 to \$25 or more per ton less than the quotations which some of the competing companies have been charging. An advance of major products by the corporation that would meet prices of competitors coming down might be a surprising development, but one that might have considerable effect in stabilizing industry in many directions.

The slump of 11% to 12 cents per bushel in wheat futures at Chicago, resulted, according to market reports, from increased offerings from the farms as well as from further speculative operations for the fail. At \$1.95 per bushel, the recent change in this market was emphasized by the fact that the quotation stood 25 cents lower than the government's guaranteed price at the farm, and more than 68 cents below the quotation established for December deliveries when the futures market was recepend on July 15.
