

High School Block Valued at \$41,000

Real Estate Men Set Market Value Figure at Request of Board of Education.

Appraisal of the Central High school grounds was made by a committee appointed by the Omaha Real Estate board at \$41,000, computed on the basis of market value.

The school board has requested a valuation of the school property so that bonds could be issued to raise money to acquire a conveyance of the property from the state.

The Real Estate board, at its meeting in the Chamber of Commerce yesterday afternoon, discussed the appraisal, many declaring that an estimated value of 200 or 250 per cent should be added to the market value. This would give an assembled value of approximately \$1,000,000, which, it is thought, will be the final figure. Individual appraisals made by members placed the value of the property at \$800,000, \$451,000, \$1,000,000 and \$420,000.

Those in favor of the low figure took into consideration the fact that deed to the property is entailed with a provision that it be used for educational purposes only, and on this account its valuation should be computed on the basis of its reasonable market or naked value. The question will come up for further consideration at a meeting of the committee with members of the school board.
