London, Oct. 15 .- The high cost of living in England is at an end.
"The war boom is over," according to the London newspapers which announce the fact with prominently displayed streamers across their front pages. They indicate that the English are optimistic of giving the knockout blow very soon to the remaining high prices.

During the last six months the average fall in prices on raw ma-terials has been 30 per cent. Rub-ber products have come down 50 per cent, tin has tumbled 25 per cent, copper 6 per cent, merino wool 45 per cent and American cotton 30 per

Declaring that the output has now outstripped the purchasing power, the London Times says that the "high tide of artificial prosperity" has at last begun to ebb in the United States."

"The decline in English has been more rapid," the Times points out.


