Would you expect the author of these lines to be interesting? The opportunity to decide whether or not he is, will be afforded in Omaha when Alfred Kreymborg appears before the Omaha Drama League Monday, October 25, Blackstone hotel, at 4 p. m. Mr. Kreymborg is the exponent of evolution in the form of music prose, free verse and free verse play. He will present "Lima Beans," a farce originally produced by Provincetown players in 1916. It is said to be the most popular of his plays for poem-mimes. It ex-

Mrs. Obendorfer Lectures Here Wednesday

"Americanization Through Music," will be the subject of a lecture read given by Mrs. Marx Obendorfer of Chicago, Wednesday afternoon, 3:45 o'clock, in the Y. W. C. A. auditorium, under the auspices of the Tuesday Musical and Omaha Women's club. To illustrate the lecture, vocal emphasizes Mr. Kreymborg's theory of pantomime acting or dancing of folk or automaton to the accompaniment of rhythmic lines in place of music. In his plays for poem-mimes it is said of Kreymborg that he is a poetic and interpretive playwright of original and authentic power, a claimant for wide recognition on the American stage. He is credited with having created a new dramatic form. Mrs. W. A. C. Johnson, membership chairman, will be at the ball room of the Blackstone preceding Mr. Kreymborg's lecture, to take new memberships to the Drama League. The next number of the Drama League program for the year, will be given November 9, when Miss Kate McHugh will lecture on "Caliban in English literature."

At the recent biennial of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, held in Des Moines in June, the clubs passed a resolution condemning the vulgar popular songs of the day and promising support to aid in the development of all good American music.
