

Secretaries of Commerce Bodies To Aid Farmers

Two Outstanding Problems Presented by Omaha Man To Convention of Nebraska Officials.

Ways and means of helping Nebraska farmers was the principal subject of discussion by the Nebraska Chamber of Commerce secretaries in their annual conference in the Omaha Chamber of Commerce rooms Friday and Saturday.

Mr. McIntosh outlined briefly the organized interests that exist for the uplift and betterment of farmers, and explained that because of the magnitude of a city such as Omaha, the Chamber of Commerce cannot carry on lines of work that will directly reach the farmer.

Therefore, he said, the Omaha bureau of agriculture has confined its efforts mainly to assisting such organizations already in touch with farm problems of education, co-operation, and production.

"One of these problems is absolutely fundamental," he declared. "It comprehends all problems of agricultural progress and prosperity. This problem is to keep the tiller of the soil a land owning farmer."

The other pressing problem is the rehabilitation of the cattle industry.

"Chambers of commerce and all right thinking men must address themselves to the solution of this tenacious problem. As secretaries of Chambers of Commerce, you find this very difficult to do because too many of your members are landlords. But I would focus your attention on the subject because the landless people are a discontented people."

The rehabilitation of the cattle industry and stabilizing it against future adversity is of importance because a prosperous live stock industry is the basis of any sound, economic system of agriculture.

Off to Chicago. "This is because live stock is produced largely by by-products of waste in farming operations, and through consumption of this waste they restore or maintain the fertility of the soil."

The secretaries from out in the state with representatives from the Omaha Chamber of Commerce left on a special train for Chicago last night to attend the national secretaries' convention there, beginning Monday, October 25.

Labor Faces Hard Fight In England

Plea for Industrial Peace Made at Convention of Trades Union Congress.

London, Oct. 23.—J. H. Thomas, chairman of the trades union congress, in his opening address at the annual meeting at Portsmouth predicted the hardest winter for labor it has experienced in many years.

He made a plea for industrial peace in view of the bad trade outlook, saying that labor did not want to fight, but was at the same time determined not to give up the results of years of struggle and privation at the demand of the capitalists.

Referring to the recent action of labor in interfering with the Russo-Polish policy, Thomas said that it was frankly a challenge to the British constitution, but was justified by the crisis.

The council of action, he declared, was organized only to meet this crisis, and would be disbanded immediately after the object for which it was organized, complete independence of Poland, and peace with Russia, was carried out. At the same time he added that the action did not carry with it the approval of the soviet method of government.

Man Who Lives With Wife 15 Years Entitled to Prize

Kid McCoy, Former Boxer and Now a Film Star, Who Has Made Eight Trips to Altar, Has Some New Releases on Marriage.

Los Angeles, Oct. 23.—Kid McCoy, long distance marriage champion, whose latest wife has just been granted a divorce, has returned to Los Angeles on business matters.

McCoy, whose real name is Norman Selby, and who is well known in boxing circles, and also as a film actor, has the following to say regarding the marriage institution after eight experiments at the marriage altar:

"Any man who stays married to the same wife for 15 years should be lionized by the government. "Wives are like fine paintings—no connoisseur is ever satisfied with one; he wants a collection. "Brunettes are the most satisfying women, I am sure—all of my wives have been blondes. "Lots of wives keep a man young. I've tried every known species except a business girl and a suffragist. "A golden wedding anniversary isn't enough—10 years ought to bring a diamond shower from sympathetic friends. "I'm not a Bluebeard—I'm a prophet. "McCoy has been collecting fine paintings in France and talked of wives in terms of pictures."

Baku Citizens Familiar With Red Terrorism

People Crowded Into Houses And Many Near Starvation Since Occupation of City By Bolsheviks.

By JOHN CLAYTON. (Chicago Tribune Foreign News Service.) Constantinople, Oct. 23.—It was on April 28 that the Azerbaijan bolshevik republic was declared. The bolshevik troops had not yet entered Baku, but were within a day's march of the city, entering it the following day. The overturn of the democratic government followed a long period of propaganda in which the communists recruited most of the more ignorant working classes to their banners.

They were held in check, however, until the troops of the Red army were within striking distance, when the government deserted Baku and those of the bourgeois who could leave the city fled in panic, leaving it at the mercy of the small, lawless group of radicals.

The story of the development of bolshevism there after the 28th of April is much the same as in Russia during the winter of 1917-1918. Better technique, more systematic methods of terror, less open disorder, marked their advent. But their purposes and their acts were much the same as those of the early period of the Russian revolution.

Checks in Charge. The revolutionary committee of the local organization at once assumed control of the town, but with the arrival of the Russians the following day they were superseded by the Cheka, composed mostly of representatives from Moscow.

At once the requisitioning of houses began. It was decreed that the bolshevik residents must have 15 cubic feet of space, while 10 feet only was allowed for the bourgeois. In many cases eight or more members of refined families were forced to occupy a single room, living, eating and sleeping there. "The comfortable, misérable condition in which the people have to live bears a description," declared my informant. "No respect is paid to the separation of the sexes. In consequence of this enforced crowding it is common to find two or three married couples or several men and women not related, occupying one room."

Crowded living conditions brought suffering which was aggravated by the shortage of food. As usual, wherever bolshevism goes, famine followed soon after, and the Baku workmen, who since the arrival of the American relief, has had at least enough to keep himself alive, has seen the bread ration dwindle day by day until by the middle of July he was forced to be content with one pound of bad black bread daily for himself, and none for the other members of his family unless they, too, were workers. The scarcity of other supplies also is grave.

Food Requisitioned. All food in the city was requisitioned, and the first shipload obtained was sent via the Volga to Moscow, "as a present from the grateful inhabitants of Baku." All other objects of commerce have been declared the property of the government, and since July 17 no private shops or market stalls have been permitted to remain open, all food coming from government sources.

Thus in three short months Baku has been brought to know all the forms of suffering which follow in the wake of bolshevism. The Azerbaijan government attempted to alleviate conditions by granting mandates exempting certain classes from requisition, but none of their acts were respected by the Cheka. So far as the Russians are concerned their government does not exist.

Killing of Woman's Love Cause for Murder, Writer Says. Paris, Oct. 23.—Feminist lectures in the St. Lazare women's prison are being conducted daily by Mme. Bessarabe, the French playwright, who has confessed to murdering her husband and shipping the body to Nancy in a trunk.

Inmates of the prison are permitted to talk freely during exercise hour and Mme. Bessarabe delivers little talks on the rights of the sex. She is much applauded and is reported to have gained numerous converts.

In her spare time she is writing a book in which she is to be entitled "The Husband I Killed," in which she extols the theory that if a man kills a woman's love and thereby her soul it is open to her to slay his body.

McCoy's long list of wives include Lottie Fischer, a girl from the farm; Julia Woodward, whom he married three times; Indianola Arnold, comic opera singer; Mrs. Edward C. Ellis, a widow; Edna Valentine, a New York society girl, and the present Mrs. Kid McCoy, who was Dagmar Dalgren, a dancer.

Treat 'Em Rough. The former ring star concluded his philosophizing on matrimony by saying: "A wife should be firm and have some conception of change. In return for her charms a man should treat her rough. Women like it. Why, since Dagmar filed her complaint against me for a divorce several women have written and wired to me that if I am really as cruel as Dagmar makes out I must be an ideal husband."

McCoy says jealousy has been the cause of most of his marital troubles. But he has not lost faith in woman-kind. Far from it, he asserted: "I hope to be able to live to marry many more."
