

St. Louis American Ball Player and Rathstein to Testify in Series Probe

Chicago, Oct. 25.—The special Cook county base ball jury will convene tomorrow with two witnesses, who have not yet appeared before the jurors, scheduled to give testimony which officials in the state's attorney's office tonight said "undoubtedly would throw considerable light on the scandal in the 1919 world's series and might prove of a sensational character."

Joe Gedeon, second baseman of the St. Louis American league club, and Arnold Rothstein of New York, are the men who are expected to testify. Gedeon arrived today from his home in Sacramento in response to a call from Han B. Johnson, president of the American league, to come and give the jury any information he may have.

He was immediately taken to the home of an assistant state's attorney and not allowed to see anyone. It was announced that the St. Louis player would not be allowed to testify until he signed an immunity waiver and that he had agreed to do this.

The state's attorney's office announced that it had positive information that Rothstein would reach here tomorrow and that he also would sign an immunity waiver before going before the jurors.

Han Johnson also probably will testify. The names of Gedeon and Rothstein have been brought before the jury by several witnesses, state officials said, but it was not until last week that Gedeon's identity was publicly revealed. He had until then, been referred to in announcements made by the state's attorney's office, merely as "a St. Louis player."

The jury has been told that Gedeon attended all the 1919 world series games and was intimately associated with some of the Chicago White Sox players, against whom true bills have been voted, according to state officials. After last Tuesday's session of the jury recessed, Johnson admitted to newspaper men that Gedeon's name had been brought before the jury and later he went to St. Louis for what was then believed to be a conference with Phil Ball, owner of the St. Louis Browns, to discuss the reorganization. On his return, however, Johnson said he went to see Gedeon and, finding the player was in Sacramento, telephoned him that he must come here immediately to testify.

However, it was evaded in Saturday's contest that the local squad is able to put up a hard struggle with any eleven in the Missouri Valley.

The Marquette squad has played three games thus far this year, winning one. The Repton college eleven, member of the Wisconsin conference, lost to the Milwaukee team.

Friday afternoon Commerce High and Fremont clash at Rourke park in the local's second home game of the season. Coach Drummond's Broctons have yet to suffer a defeat, and expect to add another victory to their list when they buck up against the light Fremont aggregation.

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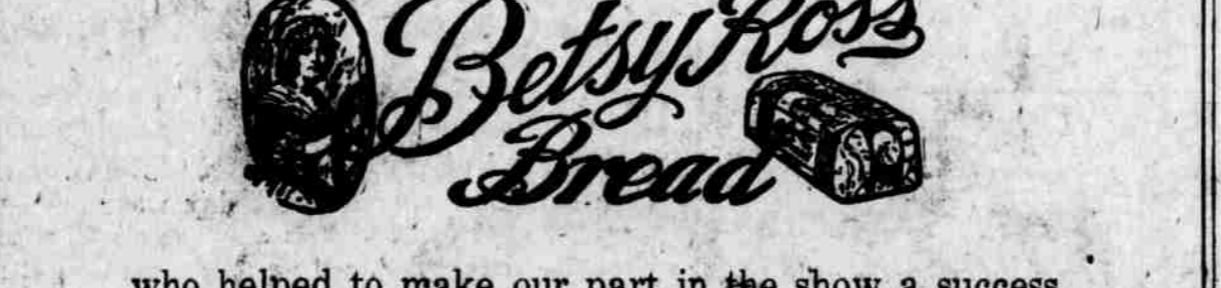
