

### 20 Thefts In 24 Hours of Omaha Crime Carnival

Thugs, Highwaymen, Thieves and Robbers Continue to Hold Omaha In Grip.

Thugs, highwaymen, thieves, robbers and their ilk continued to hold Omaha in their grip Tuesday night with 20 thefts, holdups and burglaries reported to Central police headquarters.

Diamond rings, kodaks, coats and other articles of clothing valued at more than \$500, comprised the loot of burglars who entered the home of Mrs. M. Dushak, 320 North Twenty-fourth street, by removing the lock from the front door.

**Kearney Cops Waging War Against African Golfers**

Kearney, Neb., Oct. 27.—(Special.)—The police here seem to be making considerable headway toward breaking up games of "African golf," which seems to have become exceedingly popular.

Yesterday a raid netted sixteen arrests out of a possible thirty players. This game was staged in the open, on banks of the Walker channel, and some of the players, in their mad flight for safety, took to the water to escape. With two exceptions the young men were given fines of \$10 and costs. The exceptions got \$50 and costs, being old offenders.

Last week nearly a dozen arrests were made and crap shooters donated over \$400 to the city in fines. The police are determined to head off gambling and the court promises to help by boosting the first offense fine to \$25 if necessary.

By means of a "current deflector" and T. N. T. operations State Engineer Johnson and County Surveyor Louis Adams are attempting to force the stream back into its old course.

The T. N. T. operations started Tuesday. Heavy charges used to remove snags and driftwood in the river threw columns of water from 100 to 150 feet in the air.

Dials have been placed on 8,700 Douglas and Tyler telephones as one of the steps necessary to prepare for the establishment of automatic service in Omaha's downtown district.

Tests show that many telephones are disconnected in Omaha every day by subscribers moving the dial but slightly while carrying on a conversation. Movement of the dial but one-sixteenth of an inch cuts off the subscriber at conversation.
