She is haunted by the elder woman; she cannot exchange a civil word with the man without knowing that the eyes of the mother are following her as though she were a thief who must be kept under surveillance.

Problems That Perplex. Answered by BEATRICE FAIRFAX. Suggestions for Halloween. October 31 is Halloween, or the Eve of All Saints, the holiday time of eyes, witches and ghosts.

Halloween parties are usually masked affairs, the guests donning costumes of ghosts or witches. Jack-o'-lanterns, with which the rooms are lighted, are made from hollowed pumpkins with candles inside. The candle light shines through the holes cut like features. Cornstalks and autumn leaves may also be used in the decorations.

Guests are sometimes invited to come attired as ghosts. They are sent around to the back door or basement entrance to get in. The house should be dark except for jack-o'-lanterns or candles. Pin a number on the back of each person. For the first game have guests guess each other, writing down the name which he thinks goes with each number.

Another game—have guests see how many different words they can get out of Halloween, not using any letter more times in any one word than it appears in Halloween. Also, have guests compose a telegram made up of words taken from Halloween.

An apple is peeled all in one piece, and the paring swung three times around the head and dropped behind the left shoulder. If it does not break, and is looked at over the shoulder it forms the initial of the true sweetheart's name.

Write a ring and goblet this charm may be tried: The ring, symbol of

marriage, is suspended by a hair within a glass, and a name spelled out by beginning the alphabet over each time the ring strikes the glass.

Letters of the alphabet are carved on a pumpkin. Fate guides the hand of the blindfolded seeker to the fateful initial which he stabs with a pin.

Letters cut out of paper are sprinkled on water in a tub. They form groups from which any one with imagination may spell out names.

Blindfold two of the guests and seat them on the floor facing each other. Give each a bowl of cracker crumbs and a tablespoon, with instructions to feed each other. This is funnier than it sounds.

Apples or doughnuts are suspended from a string, one for each guest. A prize is given to the one who first succeeds in eating his apple or doughnut. It is quite permissible to use the hands. Each guest must try to secure his apple with his teeth as it swings to and fro.

The one who first succeeds in threading a needle as he sits on an overturned jug on the floor will be first married.

Twelve candles are lighted and placed at convenient distances on the floor in a row. As the guests leap over them the first he blows out will indicate his wedding month. One candle only placed on the floor and blown out in the same way means a year of wretchedness ahead. If it still burns, it presages a year of joy.

Apples are placed in a tub of water. Each guest must secure his apple with his teeth as it floats on the water.

To see the face of your lover, walk down the cellar stairs backward with a candle in one hand and a mirror in the other.

A suitable menu for fall or winter may be chosen from the following: Wieners, sandwiches, doughnuts, gingerbread, cider, popcorn, apples, nuts and a Halloween cake. A ring, thimble, penny and button baked in the cake foretell respectively speedy marriage, a journey, spinsterhood, wealth and bachelorhood.
