

Farmers' Strike Bitterly Scored By Julius Barnes

Former Director of Grain Corporation, Strongly Against Any Organization for Fixing Prices on Wheat.

Chicago, Nov. 6.—Julius H. Barnes, former director general of the United States Grain Corporation, Friday appeared before the marketing committee of the American Farm Bureau federation, offering opinion and suggestions on the subject of grain marketing and outlining major influences on price fluctuations on trading exchanges.

In his statement, Mr. Barnes said that it was his firm conviction that the present system of grain grading through open exchanges by maintaining a high competitive market at all times, worked to the advantage of both producer and consumer and that future trading was beneficial in that it furnished insurance for traders against destructive losses on commitments, which would, of necessity, be taken in wider margins of profits without exchange hedging.

Touches on Price Decline. Touching upon recent declines in wheat prices, which some agricultural interests of the country have claimed are unwarranted by the existing supply and demand, Mr. Barnes said that the wheat producer had "reaped the full effect of deflation" because of the "cushion" found in future trading.

He cited figures tending to show that the decline in wheat from the peak post-war price to the current level had been only 18 per cent, as against a decline of 68 per cent in potatoes, for which there is no exchange market. Similar comparisons reveal declines of 35 per cent in cotton, 47 per cent in beans and 46 per cent in barley, the statement said.

Deputy Jail Warden And Trusty Killed By Crazy Prisoner

Mount Holly, N. J., Nov. 6.—Deputy Warden W. Harry King of the Burlington county jail and Charles Vernon Bartlett, a trusty, were beaten to death with a stove poker in the jail by Harry Asay, a prisoner, who was said to be suffering from delirium tremens.

King was killed when he went to Asay's cell to give him medicine. Rushing from the cell, Asay encountered Bartlett in the jail kitchen beating him so severely that he died tonight. Another "trusty" also was attacked, but he escaped before the crazed man could reach him with the poker. Asay then fled to the jail yard and tried to scale a 20-foot wall. Failing, he armed himself with an axe and an iron pipe, threatening Joseph Jones, colored prisoner who had grappled with him in jail. He was subdued a few minutes later and locked up.

Asay, a scrap-iron dealer of Burlington, was arrested Wednesday night for drunkenness and sentenced to a month in jail. He developed delirium tremens and was placed in a cell 60 years old.

France, Britain And Italy Sign Tripartite Pact

Paris, Nov. 6.—France, Great Britain and Italy have signed a tripartite agreement in which they agreed to support each other in maintaining their "spheres of influence" in Turkey. The limits of the areas in which the respective special interests of France and Italy are recognized, are defined by the same document.

This agreement it developed, was signed at Sevres, August 10, the day the public ceremonial of the signing of the peace treaty with Turkey took place.

Although the agreement, it is explained, is not considered a secret one, it nevertheless has not been made public until now, after a lapse of nearly three months since the signing. Under its own terms, the document was to come into force and be published at the time the Turks peace treaty should go into effect. This date is still an uncertainty.

In connection with examination of the text of the agreement, attention is being called to the fact that while the treaty defines the spheres of influence of France and Italy—recognizing the special interests of France in Cilicia and the western part of Kurdistan bordering on Syria and of Italy in southern Anatolia—the British spheres of influence are not only undefined but are not mentioned. This has raised the question that if the agreement is susceptible of the interpretation that the British interests may be held to extend to any or all the remaining parts of the Turkish empire.

It is noted also that while the agreement does not take the form of an alliance, it pledges the contracting powers to "render diplomatic support to each other in maintaining their respective positions in the areas in which the special interests are recognized."

One section of the document provides for the exploitation of the Bagdad railway by a company in which British, French and Italian capital is equally interested. It also gives the exploitation of the Heraclea coal mines, between Konieh and Adana, to Italy.

Chicago Tenants See Faint Ray of Light In Housing Situation

The labor unions have signed an agreement to suspend their jurisdictional disputes, the prime cause for all strikes, for a period of 18 months. This is a tremendous step forward and contractors are now encouraged to go ahead with the building operations which have fallen almost to the vanishing point.

Some building materials, notably lumber, some varieties of hardware and nails, are considerably cheaper, and with labor agreeing to cease bickering and give a day's work for a day's wage, prospects are bright for a great revival in home building.

Shortage of Water Forces Big Paper Plant to Close

Escanaba, Mich., Nov. 6.—The Escanaba Paper company, one of the largest in the northwest, will close Saturday due to shortage of water caused by lack of rainfall in nearby streams. During the past month the plant has been running half capacity. The plant employs hundreds of men.

Negro Arrested as Suspect in Murder Of Girl at St. Louis

St. Louis, Nov. 6.—Police arrested a negro in connection with the slaying of Miss Edna Ellis, 18, stenographer, whose body was found early Friday in a clump of weeds in a vacant lot in the northwestern section of the city near the girl's home.

The negro's initials correspond with initials on a slip of paper found near the scene of the crime, the police said.

The girl's lacerated hands gave mute testimony of the desperate fight she made for her life.

Mrs. Marfa Ellis, mother of the girl, told police Edna usually arrived home about 6 p. m., but worked over time last night to earn extra money to purchase Christmas presents.

Federal Offices Change. The money order and central accounting departments in the federal building have swapped offices. The money order department is now located in the northwest corner of the building, while the cashier's and central accounting department is located in the southeast corner.

Bride Drinks Poison When Hubby Threatens to Leave

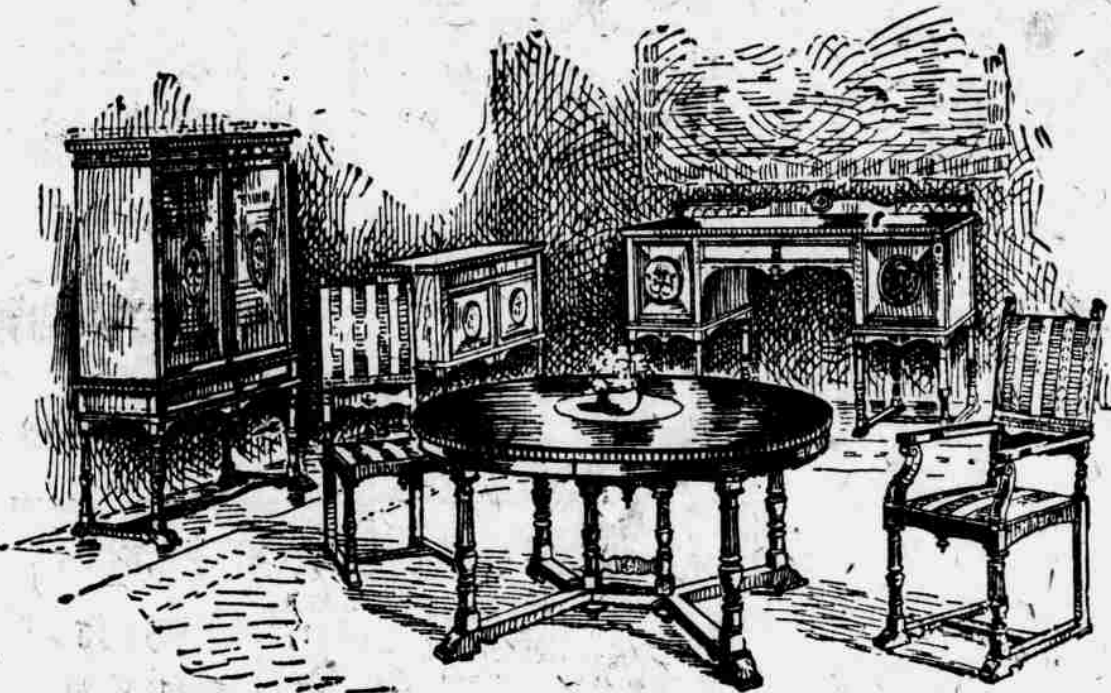

Publisher Charges Unjust Deportation From Great Britain

Washington, Nov. 5.—E. J. Costello of Chicago, managing editor of the Federated Press, whose expulsion from England was ordered recently by the British government because of his association with persons of alleged radical views, made formal complaint to the State department that he had been unjustly deported. Secretary Coby promised to have an investigation made and arranged for Mr. Costello to discuss the matter with the counselor of the department.

In a memorandum to the secretary, Mr. Costello said he wished to obtain from the department an expression of its attitude toward the cases of American newspapermen, who "incur the displeasure of foreign governments and who may in consequence be arrested and deported without a hearing and without charges being properly stated. He declared that American correspondents, in their work abroad, necessarily must be expected to come into contact with persons of all shades of political belief.

Entire Wrangel Force Facing Annihilation

Swift and overwhelming attacks were launched simultaneously by five bolshevik armies totaling 150,000 troops. This has enabled Budenny's crack cavalry corps to attack concentrically Kachovka bridgehead on the Dnieper and hack their way clear across the mouth of the Crimean isthmus, cutting the sole railway line at Nevo Alexievk. Advance guards have reached Genitch on the sea of Azov.

All the Wrangel armies fighting in south Russia, most of which are massed on the Miltopol region, are cut off from their base in Crimea and are menaced with capture, although General Wrangel's headquarters assert that isolated groups, fighting their way through the surrounding red cavalry cordon, are reaching Crimea.

Bulls Scarce in New York; Bull Fighter Goes to Peru

New York, Nov. 5.—The champion bull fighter is with us but he isn't staying very long for lack of public bulls to slay. He is Juan Garcia Belmonte, of Spain. He has laid 200 of the ferocious rousers low and is enroute to Lima, Peru, where he is assured of opportunities of giving the coup de grace to some more.
