

Production in Five 1920 Crops Exceeds Record

Low First and Nebraska Third in Corn Raised—Value Lower Than Last Year, Due to Price Slump.

Washington, Nov. 8.—(Special)—American farmers have broken production records of five crops this year. Preliminary estimates announced by the Department of Agriculture show the corn, tobacco, rice, sweet potatoes and pear crops surpassed in size those of any previous year in the country's history.

In addition very large crops were grown, in some instances closely approaching records of oats, barley, rye, potatoes, apples and hay. The buckwheat production record, however, has stood since 1866 with this year's crop more than 8,000,000 bushels under it.

Final crop production figures will be announced next month. Corn, king of all crops and of which the United States grows more than 70 per cent of the world's output, reported the enormous total of 3,199,126,000 bushels. That is 75,000,000 bushels more than ever before grown in any year. This is the third corn crop to exceed 3,000,000,000 bushels, the previous record having been made in 1912, while the crop of 1917 was the second largest.

In point of value this year's corn crop will not equal that of last year, which based on the December 1 price of \$1.33 a bushel, was worth \$3,934,234,000. The crop of 1912 was valued at \$1,520,454,000 on the December 1 price of 48.7 cents a bushel, and the 1917 crop at \$3,920,228,000 with the December price almost \$1.30 a bushel. The value of this year's crop based on the November 1 farm price, which was 87.3 cents a bushel, is estimated at \$2,792,837,000.

Iowa's corn crop is the largest of any state at 441,660,000 bushels. Illinois ranks second with 302,634,000 bushels and Nebraska third at 260,998,000 bushels.

The tobacco crop this year, placed at 1,476,444,000 pounds by the preliminary estimate, is 87,000,000 pounds more than grown last year when all previous records were broken. Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina, exceeded their last year's production, while Kentucky's crop this year is 36,000,000 pounds less than a year ago.

Production of rice this year exceeds by 12,000,000 bushels the previous largest crop in 1917. The output this year is placed at 22,998,000 bushels, almost half of which was grown in Louisiana.

The sweet potato harvest will show 105,676,000 bushels, which is 2,000,000 bushels more than grown last year, when the crop exceeded all previous year's production. Alabama's output is larger than any other state.

The crop of pears this year is placed at 15,558,000 bushels. The previous largest crop was that of 1917 when 13,281,000 bushels were produced. California produced more than 3,000,000 bushels, while New York's production is almost 2,250,000 bushels.

Auto License Fund Law May Be Changed

Lincoln, Nov. 8.—(Special)—A committee of the State Good Roads association, consisting of George F. Wolz of Fremont and C. H. Gov. McKelvie Returns From Hunting Trip

State Executive Has Little to Say in Regard to Politics—Still in Doubt as to Appointments.

Lincoln, Nov. 8.—(Special)—A big bouquet, presented by the employees of the executive department, reposed on the desk of Governor McKelvie when he arrived at his office this morning.

The governor has been hunting in the western part of the state, and while he was willing to admit that there are a few ducks left up there, he would not say how many he brought back. However, he said the ducks were not taking any chances and consequently while the hunting was good, the getting was of a negative nature. There was plenty of grouse and under the unerring aim of the executive, several of them were retrieved by Secretary of Agriculture Leo Stuhr, who went along and helped Chief Game Warden George Koster locate the birds so that their chief could bring them down.

Speaking of politics, the governor had little to say. He naturally was pleased over the election, but had not made up his mind as to his future course regarding appointments and recommendations to the legislature. He will make some recommendations for changes in the code law, but as yet will not make them public.

Among some of the appointments which will have to be made will be members of the state normal board. The new constitution provides that the six shall be appointed, two for two years, two for four and two for six years.

Head of Omaha Boys' Home Scores Big Hit in North Platte

North Platte, Neb., Nov. 8.—(Special Telegram)—Father Flanagan and his boys from Omaha were greeted last evening at the entertainment at the Kerth theater by one of the most enthusiastic audiences that ever assembled in North Platte. It is estimated that over 800 people were unable to gain admittance to the theater. Father Flanagan has decided to return in the near future and give another entertainment.

Charles Pass greeted Father Flanagan on behalf of the citizens of North Platte. Former Governor Keith Neville, Mayor Stretz and 25 citizens acted as reception committee and were seated on the stage. Professor A. H. Toher acted as chairman of the evening. Father McDaid, pastor of the local Catholic church, an intimate friend of Father Flanagan, delivered an inspiring talk.

Rev. Mr. Flanagan, founder and director of the Boys' Home, gave an address on behalf of the work of reconstruction that his home is doing. He said that during the past two years he had cared for some 800 boys of every creed, color and nationality. At the request of Father McDaid and the local Knights of Columbus, M. J. Flanagan, the Irish tenor of Omaha sang several selections. A purse of \$1,500 was given to Father Flanagan to help him erect his new home.

Celebration Planned. Sutton, Neb., Nov. 8.—(Special Telegram)—An elaborate program has been arranged for the Armistice day celebration here, consisting of a big parade, followed by an address by Congressman Sloan in the forenoon and Congressman-elect Andrews in the afternoon. Many other features have also been planned.

Recumseh Woman Wins Suit To Obtain Share in Estate

Recumseh, Neb., Nov. 8.—(Special Telegram)—A jury in the Johnson county district court has given a verdict to Miss Margaret Farren, in the will case of the late Thomas Farren. Miss Farren was a niece of Mr. Farren and cared for him during his illness. He had no family, but willed her only \$5. Mr. Farren left a considerable estate to nieces and nephews, including a good quarter section farm in this county. The will will not be probated, the case coming to the district court from the county court, and Miss Farren will share equally in the estate. Her portion will amount to about \$5,000.

Man, Who Escaped During Raid on Still, Captured

Broken Bow, Neb., Nov. 8.—(Special Telegram)—Floyd Bothwell, the man who escaped from officers during the raid on the whisky still at Anselmo two weeks ago, was captured at Grand Island and returned to this county by Sheriff Talbot early this morning. Bothwell pleaded guilty to three charges: Manufacture, illegal possession and sale of liquor. He is an alleged deserter from the United States army, and will immediately be turned over to the federal authorities.
