It added that private ownership and operation with public regulation was the "only just and honest manner of conducting the public utility bus-ness of this country."

Mr. Lucey told the convention that the situation in Illinois regarding the public utility commission would "bear watching to see what come out of it." The governor-elect, he said, had won on a plat-form of municipal ownership and home rule, but had run 400,000 votes behind Senator Harding because "there are enough honest republicaus in Illinois who do not believe in the program of confiscation of private property."
