# **Police Protest** When Gamblers

Majority of Persons Rounded Up in Chicago Raids Are Turned Loose; Others Receive Light Fines.

versal Service Staff Correspo Chicago, Nov. 23 .- The greatest Array of gamblers ever seen under one roof in Chicago appeared in the South Clark street police station Monday, when 942 persons, arrested in Sunday's gambling raids, were arigned for trial.

The speedy disposal of 442 of the cases brought-a protest from police authorities, prosecutors and others when fines of \$25 were assessed Alleged Embe against some of the prisoners and a majority of them were released. Men who are known to have won \$25,000 in a single night paid their \$25 fines and went their way. Only the keepers of gambling houses who leaded guilty were fined.

#### Big Winner Fined.

Clarence Lazarus, who owns one of the most luxurious gambling apartments in the city, paid \$25. The police have records to show that he as won \$25,000 at a single sitting. 
