

Thanksgiving To Be General Holiday Here

Business Houses Close to Allow Employees to Set Feet Under Festive Boards; To Be Observed by Churches.

Thanksgiving in Omaha today will be as generally observed as in the past, which means that the population will gather about festive boards to feast, that many offices and factories will close and that services will be held in many churches.

Hundreds of Omahans are packing their grips, preparing to tie themselves away to the farm, where they know "Pa" and "Ma" and a table morning under the weight of tempting food await them.

Hundreds more are pouring into Omaha to spend the day of thankfulness with dear ones here. Travel to and from the city will be heavier than ever before, according to Louis Beindorf, manager of the consolidated ticket office.

Ticket Office Closed. Incidentally, Mr. Beindorf announced the ticket office would be closed all day today to permit a score or more of employees to enjoy the day properly.

Thousands of other railroad office employees will be given a full holiday today, and large downtown stores are closing for the entire day. Suburban grocery stores may remain open a short time this morning to allow forgetful ones to purchase necessities for the big dinner, but will be closed most of the day.

Jobbing houses, too, will observe the holiday, and banks of the city all will be closed. Even barbers will lay aside their trusty razors for half a day.

Grain Dealers Plan to Advance Money on Wheat

Scheme to Overcome Difficulties of Farmers, Due to Low Prices, Announced by Kansas Buyers.

Wichita, Kan., Nov. 24.—A new way to relieve wheat farmers of difficulties as the result of low prices and a strained money situation, has been devised by mill and elevator operators here and in other grain centers of the southwest.

A plan of advancing to grain growers \$1 a bushel on wheat carried on contract so that they may deliver now and sell at some future date has been adopted by a large list of elevators and mills. The inauguration of this plan is primarily to relieve the money situation, it was said. Millers declare the plan will move considerable wheat and stop talk of forcing the farmers to sell their grain.

The inauguration of the plan, mill operators said, already has elicited much favorable comment from farmers as well as bankers.

The plan as outlined by mill and elevator men follows: "The contract with the farmers is very simple. He now has the opportunity to dispose of his wheat at once and receive in turn \$1 down. Then as he watches the market quotations he finally decides the quotations have reached the top and he can draw the remainder of his money from the miller or elevator at the basic market price. The result of the plan can be easily seen. It will relieve the farmer of holding his loan. The wheat will not be subject to weevil and the market will become more stable."

Move Is Made to End Rental Fight

Propose Compromise Between Tenants' League and Drake Company.

Efforts to effect a compromise between the Omaha Tenants' league and the Drake Holding company, operating the Drake Court apartments, which organizations have been waging a rental rate war for the past three months, were made Tuesday when representatives of both sides met and discussed four proposals, which if ratified by other members of the league will end the rent fight so far as these two bodies are concerned.

The proposal advanced by W. J. Palmer, vice president of the Drake Holding company, revokes the order which required an increase on July 1, and stipulates that the increase shall not take effect until October 1 of this year.

If this proposition is accepted, tenants who paid rent at the new scale will be refunded the difference between the old and the new scale for three months, Mr. Palmer said. The other proposals concern the trial of the case pending and will be discussed at the next meeting, when the opinions of the various members of the league will have been sounded.

New Board May Install Court House "Time Clock." It is rumored about the court house that the newly organized board of county commissioners will install "time-clocks," making it necessary for all employees to "ring-in" and "ring-out" when going to and coming from work.

Commissioner Unitt, speaking on the subject, said he favors a full day's work for a full day's pay by every employe. He said he will punch the clock himself, if they are put in.

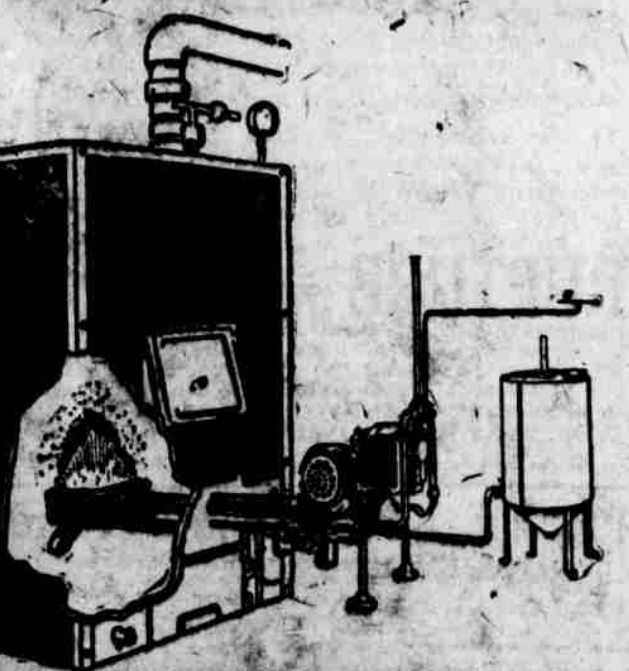
