Mother Offers \$500 for Return

Reward Adds Zest to Search For Son Whom Woman Believes Was Spirited Away By Father.

Los Angeles, Dec. 3.—A \$500 re-ward offered by Mrs. Louise M. Barrett, formerly of New York and Hollywood, Cal., today added zeal to the quest for her son. William Hurd Barrett, 11, supposed to have been kidnaped, possibly at the instance of his father, said to be Dr. Frederick Barrett, of New York, last Sunday morning.

Mrs. Barrett from San Fancisco, whither she went to confer with her attorneys shortly after the lad disappeared, telegraphed instructions that the reward be offered in hopes of getting some clue as to the whereabouts of her son. Police officials have telegraphed descriptions of young Barrett to all cities of the

Southwest, While Mrs. Barrett is said to have expressed the belief that two detectives had kidnaped the boy at the instigation of her husband, it is possible that a band of kidnapers may be holding the lad for a ransom according to theories advanced by operatives attempting to clear up the

"We are not overlooking the possibility that kidnapers may be engaged in making wholesale kidnapings," said Detective Nick Harris, who is engaged on the case.

That young Barrett was undoubtedly carried away by force is indicated by the stories of three newsboys, August Strite, Morris Orenstein and Robert Grannis. The Bar-rett boy left Hotel Hollywood Sun-day morning to visit with his grandmother, Mrs. Lydia Avery, 2544 Beachwood Drive. According to the stories told investigators by the three newsboys, he was seized and carried away in an automobile by two men while he was waiting for a ground street car near the hotel. German Commander's Report On Naval Battle at Jutland Published

Of Kidnaped Boy (New York Times-Chicago Tribune Cable, Sent out torpedo fleets to attack the Copyright, 1920.)

Jutland?

This question is one that has been pussing the world's naval authorities ever since the battle was fought.

In recent months repeated demands have been made in the British Parliament for publication of all documents relating to the greatest naval engagement of the war, but thus far the British have not published its official version, explaining that there were still some German document to be digested.


