

Toy Planes Fly 1,200 Feet and Perform Stunts

Output of Old Santa Claus' Workshop This Year Is More Amazing Than Ever Before.

A great poet once said, "A boy's will is the wind's will." Toy makers have evidently taken this saying as their motto as they have considered almost every conceivable trend of boys' minds in the manufacture of their Christmas toys.

For the ingenious and war-like there are toys of a war-time flavor. Among them are siege guns which shoot wooden bullets, machine guns shooting smaller wooden bullets and others which only make perforations in a paper tape, although the sound of the toy is wonderfully like the machine guns their grown-up brothers heard in France.

"Stunt" Airplanes. For the studious there are electrical toys, building apparatus with which houses, automobile trucks and other wonderful things may be constructed and engineering and wire-less outfits.

For the boy of mechanical turn there are railroad trains, automobiles and street cars operated by springs or electricity. Then there are airplanes which fly 100 to 1,200 feet and by clever manipulation of the stabilizer they can be made to do "stunts" known to grownup aviators.

The old standbys like father got from Santa Claus when he was a boy are not overlooked. They were rubber-tired tricycles, drums, sleds, roller skates, ice skates and sport goods.

Are American-Made. The little girls have not been forgotten by the toy makers. There are beautiful dolls, some that say "mama and mamma" in a baby voice; dishes, stoves, pianos, play houses with play furniture and all the things that delight the little feminine mind.

Most of the wonderful toys now on display at the big department stores are American-made, only a few coming from Germany and Japan. The beautifully-colored picture books, without which no Christmas would be complete, come from Germany.

Previous to the war American kiddies depended on Germany for their toys. During the war the toy market was almost ruined. Necessity showed the way to American toy makers and the result is American toys bid fair to take the front rank.

Before the war little boys liked to play war. They liked to receive guns, cannons and swords on Christmas. Some of them were dangerous.

War Toys Are Safe. The late war has left its imprint on the toy makers. They continue to cater to the little boys' military tendency by making engines of war in the exact replica of those used in the war, yet they have been careful to make them safe for peace time playing.

The general trend of toys is toward the educational and instructive kind. Toy makers are producing toys which teach as well as provide pleasure.

Metal Brackets.

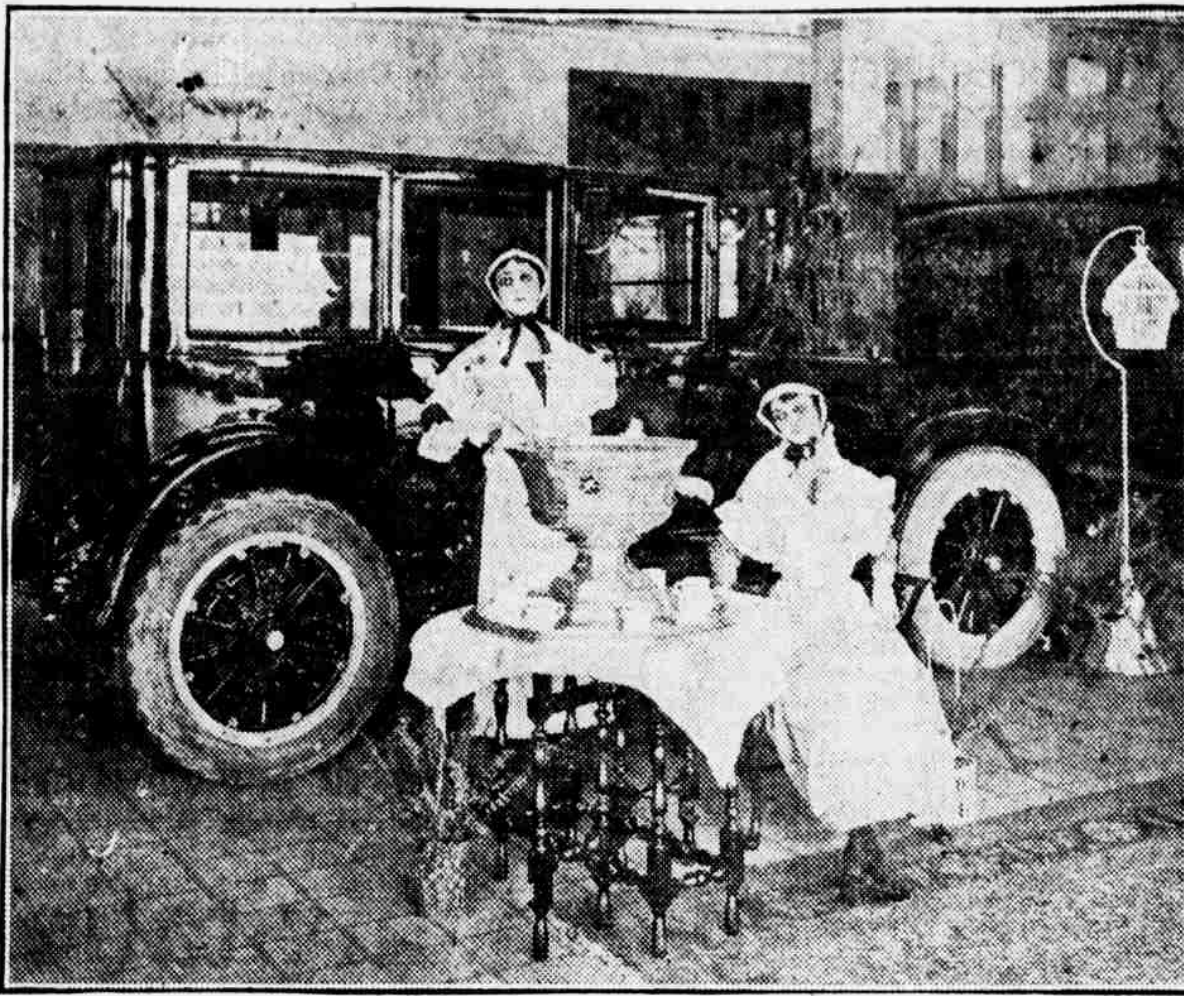
Car owners who do their own repair work often need metal brackets or angle pieces of a certain size and shape. These are quite easy to make in the garage with the ordinary tools and a vise out of soft rolled brass or iron strip from 1-16 to 1-2 inch thick, and this strip is so easy to obtain in a variety of widths from any metal warehouse that it does not pay to cut up a sheet. If brass is used it should be made quite soft by heating to redness and plunging into water. To save time and avoid waste of material always make a thin cardboard template or pattern of the fitting and then work to it. In most cases the holes for screws may be drilled before bending the strip in the vise.

Water Leaks. When water leakage develops between the rubber hose and the outlet from the cylinder jacket, or where the hose joins the radiator pipe, it can be obviated by wrapping the joints with ordinary adhesive tape. The proper method to follow is to remove the clamps, tape the joints and shellac the tape. When the shellac is dry the hose clamps should be replaced. Be sure that the clamp draws up in a perfect circle. If it is out of shape and will not draw up properly it will bunch up the rubber hose so that leakage will begin again before long.

Chipped Gears. Chipping of the gears is usually caused by gears that are too hard, a pinion too far in or too far out of mesh with the ring gear, improper alignment of either of the gears or a ring gear sprung or bent. The best remedy is to install new gears, but sometimes the chips may be fished out through the grease plug hole, or housing cover, after loosening it with a screw driver or punch, thus avoiding the necessity of disassembling the housing. If a number of teeth chip off at the outer ends chamber them by grinding.

Cam Shaft Knocks. A cam shaft moving endwise will produce a knock similar to a light connecting rod knock. As the engine speed is increased, the cam shaft is held in one position by the additional power required to drive it and the knock usually ceases. The cam shaft gear plate may be removed and pressure exerted on the end of the shaft, holding it back against the front flange or the cam shaft bearing, thereby determining if end play is producing the knock.

The MOTOR DIGEST

Java has become an important market for motor vehicles. Gasoline was first used as a liquid for cleaning of clothes.

Only one person in every 5,300 in Russia owns an automobile. Great Britain is expending \$140,000,000 a year on highways.

Senator Warren G. Harding is a member of the Chauffeurs' union at Washington, D. C.

Free schools are conducted in New York City for instruction in operation and care of motor trucks. Alabama, Arkansas, Nevada, South Dakota and Oklahoma have one motor vehicle for every mile of road.

A new motor company organized in Manitoba, with a capital of \$1,000,000, will build automobiles in Winnipeg.

Former Liberty Man To Sell Hupmobile



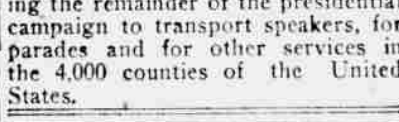

Drilling Glass.

The car owner who finds it necessary to drill holes in glass will succeed if he uses the following method: Grind the points from one corner of a small three cornered file on the bias from the other. Place this in a bit such as is used in hard wood. Place the glass to be bored on a smooth surface covered with a blanket or similar material. Begin to bore the hole exactly as if the substance were wood. When a slight hole has been made surround this with putty and fill the annular thus created with turpentine to prevent heating. Do not press too hard on the drill in boring.

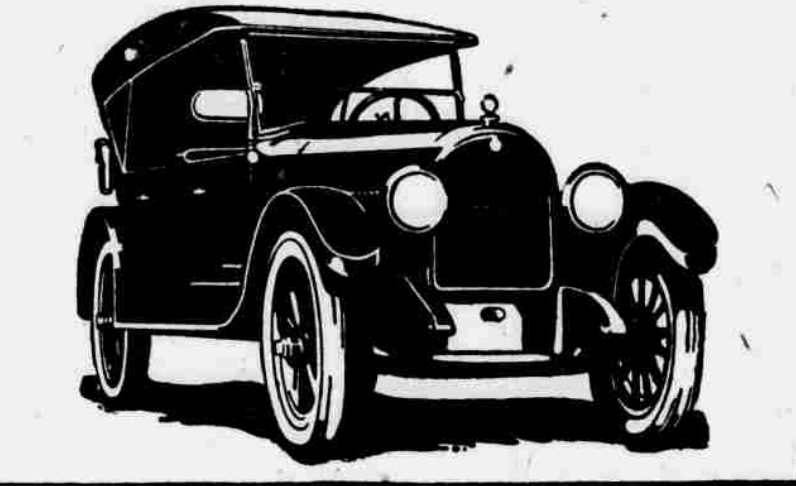
