Pavlowa Is a Cosmopolite

Is Anna Pavlowa, the incomparable, really a Russian or does she belong to the larger, "international family of artists?" That is the question. Interviewed through Marguerite Ferrier, who had many opportunities of seeing the wonderful dancer strolling unobserved through the beautiful gardens and parks of Porto Rico, the Isle of Enchantment, we learn that—apart from her dazzling art—one of Pavlowa's greatest secrets of winning over complete audiences and peoples at once, practically on her "opening night," consists largely in becoming one of the people herself.

The temperament and national view of the famous ballerina is elastic and she can assimilate a new climate, a new atmosphere, and even a new nationality with the greatest ease. Particularly is this true of her extended London sojourn, where in her Hampstead home, with its wide-spreading grounds, she has long been regarded as a native London gentlewoman "at home" rather than a foreign artist who has made her home in a strange land. In Porto Rico, in Mexico City, and in Paris, the city took Anna Pavlowa very much to its heart, and she became one of its permanent family.

In Porto Rico Mlle Pavlowa built a splendid bungalow—the Bungalow Pavlowa—on the Condada near Borinquen park. Here during her recent visit of triumph to the "Isle of Enchantment" Pavlowa could be seen daily strolling down to the sea, living the life of the Porto Ricans, enjoying the tropical luxuriance of its gardens, parks, and the wealth of its foliage.

Thus the answer to the first question would seem to be: Anna Pavlowa, the incomparable, belongs to the great family of artists known as cosmopolites.

In the United States, another of her many homes, she is making another four with her Ballet Russe and Symphony Orchestra, which brings her to this city on December 30. She will be presented at the Auditorium under the auspices of the Tuesday Musical club.
