

\$213,295,314 Is Paid Well Equipped, To U. S. Pensioners

Report Shows Figures for Year Show Decrease of \$9,000,000 Over 1919 Disbursements.

Washington, Dec. 8.—Pension dis-bursements for the fiscal year, 1920 aggregated \$213,295,314, according to the annual report of Commissioner Saltzgaber of the pension bureau made public today. The figures showed a decrease of about \$9,000,-000 from 1919 totals and the report recorded the death during the year of 27,871 civil war pensioners, leaving 243,520 soldiers of that war on the pension roll, in addition to 290,-100 civil war widows.

While no survivors of the war of 1812 were shown, 71 widows of soldiers in that war are receiving pensions. Only 148 Mexican war survivors were reported, and 2,423 Mexican war widows,

Survivors of the world war do not show on the roll. Their de-pendents alone are carried.


