

Fair Prices to Be Farmers' Topic At Conferences

Organized Agricultural Societies Will Hold Joint Meetings in Lincoln, January 3 to 7.

Lincoln, Neb., Dec. 8.—The obtaining of a fair price for agricultural products will be the general keynote of the discussions at the meetings of organized agriculture in Lincoln, January 3 to 7. Increased production and the general betterment of farming will not be neglected, and will come up for prominent consideration at several meetings, but farmers just now are more interested in better prices than in anything else. The Nebraska Crop Producers' association will devote at least half a day to soil fertility and increased yields, and the Nebraska Improved Live Stock Breeders' association will spend considerable time on the subject of pure bred sires and the improvement of live stock.

One of the big topics on the program of the Nebraska Crop Improvers' association is "The Future Outlook of Farming." The subject will be discussed from the angles of the land owner, the tenant, and the young man. Prominent land owners will speak on how they plan to obtain returns on their investment, and renters are on the program to discuss the payment of high rents.

Several other organizations will discuss similar phases of agriculture. J. H. Frandsen will address the

dairymen on the future of their industry; John Frazier, secretary of the Midwest Milk Producers' association, will tell the owners of milk cows what the farmers' milk plant can do. This organization will also give much consideration to the improvement of herds and feeding for better milk production.

The Nebraska Horticultural society will devote considerable time to the marketing end of their business. Thorne A. Browne, state railway commissioner, is billed to talk about fruit freight rates and several orchard men are on the program to discuss what can be done to improve methods of placing Nebraska fruit before the consumers.

The Nebraska farm bureau federation will consider some of the pressing problems confronting the farmers. It will give over some time to the consideration of legislation in the interest of agriculture.

Women attending the meetings of organized agriculture will have an interesting program. Prominent men and women will address them on what they should know about wills, as well as about voting.

School Week at Ord Is Celebrated by Entire City

Quite a few farmers are feeding live stock, although the total amount of feeding will be below the average. Recent wet weather has kept the pastures green and much stock is still on grass.

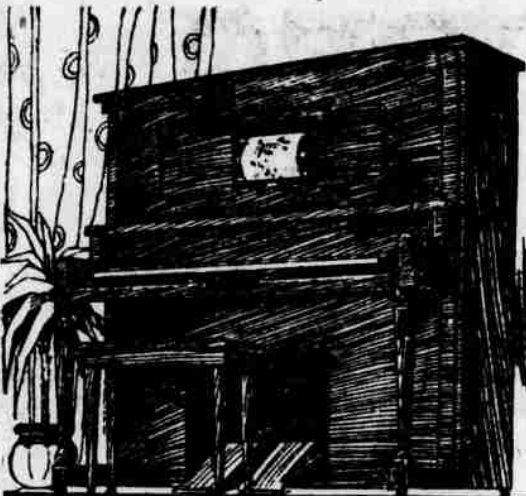

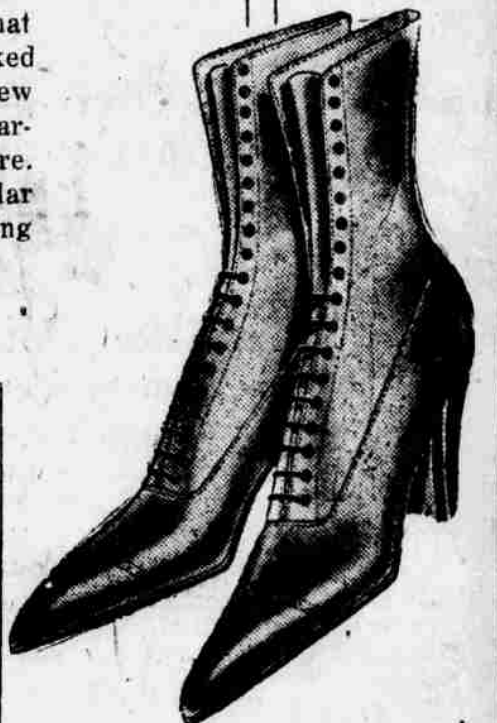

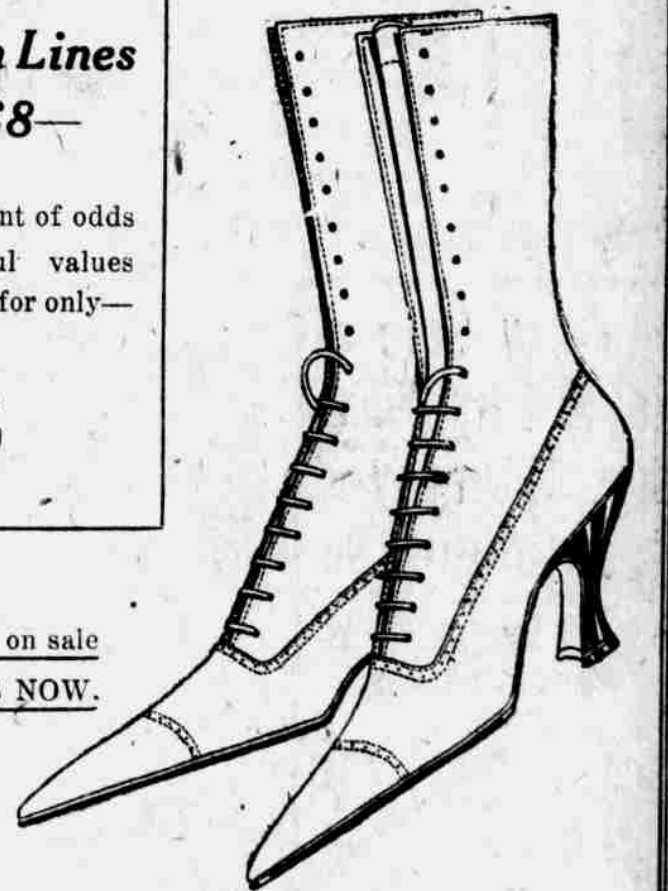
