Problems That Perplex

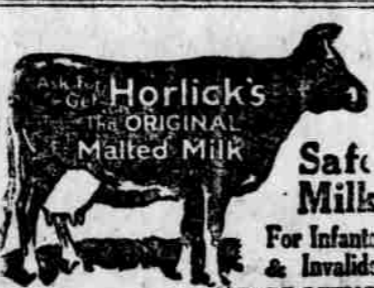

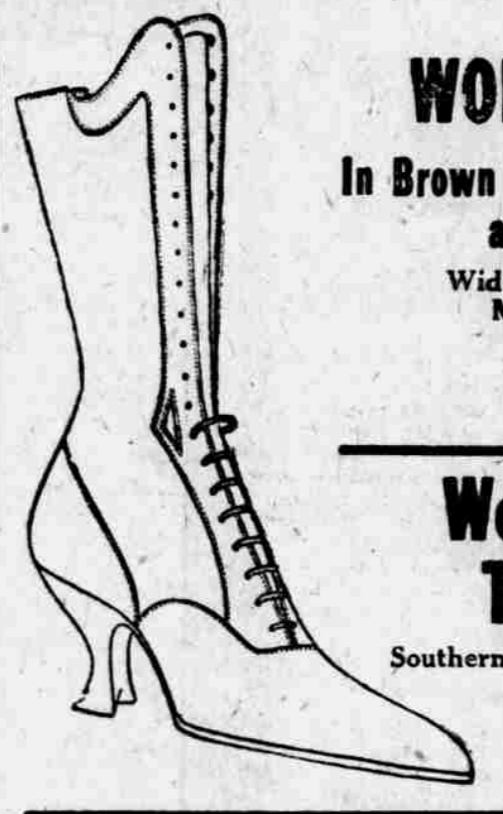
