New York, Dec. 26.-That Christmas week, with the January "invest-ment period," just ahead, should have presented an almost unvarying list of declines of securities on the exchange, and that an admittedly disappointing holiday trade at the ed promptly by announcements of heavy reduction in prices for general merchandise, might seem, on the face of things, to indicate a cheerless ending to the year.

Even United States bonds, which should normally be the focus of January reinvestments in a relaxing money market, had the experience last week of two or three days of very exceptional declines. Yet, on the other hand, the week's

early and severe decline in stocks and bonds was allowed by such evidence of good buying as served not only to cause abrupt recovery in prices but to change Wall street's mood over night. As for the impending cut in rail prices every experienced person will draw two favorable inferences from that—one, that if the "consumers' strike" is to be broken at all, it can only be done through offering to retail purchasers, the advantages of the wholesale price reductions; the other that if the wage readjustments and partial unemployment are not to become a dangerous social and political factor, they must be accompanied by an equivalent lowering of the cost of living in food and clothing prices for next spring's trade, but in the tail store today.

The matter of primary importance during this whole period of distressing really justment of values has been to find a basis on which the real purchasing nublic will do business and this is quite active of the stock exchange as of the dry goods trade. The sharp increase in this country's merchandise exports that occurred in October was not maintained during November, but was followed, instead by a \$77.000.000 decrease. This lowered the value of the month's shipments to \$675.006.000, which, though larger than in the four months immediately preceding October, is \$65.000.000 short of the November, 1219. figures. The foreign trade contraction however, was not confined to exports After October's reduction of \$22,000.000, the November imports fell off an additional \$13,000.000, making the total. \$321.000.000, the smallest of the present year. Comparing with the importations of November of last year, moreover, a decline of fully \$100,000.000 appears. The difference between the exports and imports last month are \$354.000.000, whereas it was \$415.000.000.000 in October. In November, 1913, the export excess was \$315.000.000.

Hide and Leather Conditions Irregular. Uniformity is lacking in reports from hide, leather and footwear circles, but the indications of improvement fecently noted in some quarters still appear. Capsiderable business in domestic packer hides has developed of late with a large shoe manufacturing and tanning interest. 200.000 hides being absorbed in the west and dry descriptions of foreign hides have been more active. The transactions, however, have been mainly at further price declines. While the general leather demand remains moderate, trade has continued to broaden slightly, and shoe producers who have resumed operations, or who are preparing to start un after the holidays, have been buyers. These signed between the prompted the belief that by the middle of January, at least, the situation will be more normal. A number of footwear manufacturers have booked sufficient spring orders to enable them to put their plants on a new run carly in the coming year, but retailors are concentrating their interest in holidov requirements, and will probably give the wholesale market little attention for
