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Sheppard-Towner Bill Passed by Senate

"We know that it is only everlasting industry that ever accomplished anything," said Mrs. Maud Wood Park, chairman of the National League of Women Voters, when asked if the congressional workers for the league would take a vacation during the holiday period. "The next few days are important ones for the Sheppard-Towner bill, therefore our efforts must be redoubled rather than abated."
The Sheppard-Towner bill, which is the first on the legislative program endorsed by the league and for which representatives are now actively working in Washington, is the bill which seeks to provide public protection to maternity and infancy by enabling the federal government to co-operate with the states in disseminating information concerning child hygiene and the care of mothers in order that the enormous maternal and infant death rate in this country may be reduced. It has been endorsed by the Omaha Woman's club and the Nebraska State Federation.

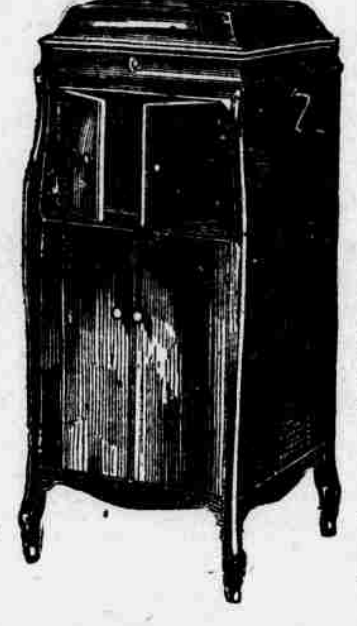
