Irish Goaded To Desperation, Says Speaker

Peter Golden, in Address Before Omaha Women, Compares His Fellow Citizens To Christian Martyrs.

"England and her hired mercenaries are goading the people of Ireland into open rebellion so she will have an excuse to shoot them down and settle the Irish question forever," Peter Golden of Cork, Ireland, declared in a speech before Omaha women in the ballroom of the Blackstone hatel yesterday afternoon.

"Not since the days of the early Christian martys has a people shown such fortitude and spirit," the speaker asserted. "England has filled Ireland with soldiers and all the implementations. ments of war. She has watched the merciless attack on women and children and the assassination of the Irish leaders, yet she has not cried a halt. Ireland spatiently bearing her yoke and only waits recognition by the world as a separate nation until she will assert herself.

Oppression Never Told.

"The real history of Ireland and the pppression by England has never been told. England has built a wall of fables around the real Ireland and has allowed the world to know only what England wants known. Now, the Irish people are telling the story as it is. They are showing the world what the oppression has meant to Ireland for the past 750 years.

"England again is wrong. She knows Ireland is rich in natural resources and geographically situated to soon command the commercial intercourse of all nations. There is no internal dissension. All but two counties are in favor of an Irish republic. Religion does not enter into the present struggle for independence. Many of our honored patriots were Protestants. In Ireland we care not what a man's religion may be if he is true to Irish principles and Irish
