Bond Market Disappointing.

The bond market as a whole was disappeinting to wheever may have looked for one of the old-fashioned general recoveries. A number of separate investments rose in price as they did last week, thereby again proving at least the market's responsiveness to any considerable reinvestment orders. But other bonds declined and prices were not in the main much altered from last week.

The bonds, however, were a lotable exception; there was very good reason why they should have been, in view of the wholly abnormal break in their price toward the end of December and of the quite exceptional inducement which their net incomes yield provides at existing prices for estates.

Several of these bonds rose 4 to 5 point in today's markets, a few of them sold 1 to 2 points above last week's lowest.
