

Omaha Members Clash Over Berths On Committees

Druesedow Seeking to Keep Foster Out of Cities and Towns Body, of Which He Wants Chairmanship.

Lincoln, Neb., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—Efforts were made today by members of the Douglas county delegation to iron out a row between Druesedow of Omaha and Foster of Omaha over berths in the committee on cities and towns.

Druesedow, who is a member of the committee on committees, is reported to be putting up a hot fight to keep Foster out of the cities and towns committee. Druesedow wants to be chairman of this committee and until he began to "knife" Foster for appointment as a member, it looked as though he would get the chairmanship, which he has held for two sessions, without trouble.

Robertson of Omaha, wants to be on the committee on banks and banking; Hascall and Dysart on the important judiciary. Others are looking forward to good appointments.

Druesedow Warned. Other members of the committee of committees tonight told Druesedow that he would have either to patch up his personal quarrel with Foster or lose chairmanship of the committee on towns and cities, according to a report here.

Such a fight not only hurts the Omaha delegation in their personal desires, it weakens our standing in the lower house and that hurts the city of Omaha. A member of the Omaha delegation said.



Value of State Property Fixed At \$57,077,834

Lands, Buildings and Equipment Worth \$45,230,671, According to First Inventory Ever Made.

Lincoln, Neb., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—The resources of Nebraska are \$67,077,834 and the liabilities nothing, according to the biennial report issued by State Auditor George W. Marsh.

The report places the value of lands, buildings and equipment owned by the state at \$45,230,671. This is the first time that an inventory has ever been made of state property.

The inventory lists \$11,151,320 as investments in interest bearing bonds. The total value of the University of Nebraska, all of its buildings, grounds, improvements and equipment, is given as \$6,692,234, while the buildings alone are listed at \$3,641,515.

Committee Chairmen Are Picked at Lincoln

Lincoln, Neb., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—The members had neglected to hand in their committee preferences at the opening of the session Wednesday and Chairman Bushee again requested that members make certain to outline their wishes in committee work.

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Jobs in Senate Chamber Start Heated Debate

"Committee of One" Reed Finds Plan of Picking Employees Not Favored; Many Seek Positions.

Lincoln, Neb., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—A minor insurrection broke out in the Nebraska state senate on the second day's session of the 40th legislative session over the matter of employees.

The storm broke around the head of Senator Perry Reed of Henderson, who has been entrusted with the sole responsibility of hiring employees for the state senate.

Reed's appointment as the committee on employees for the state senate was announced at the opening of the session Wednesday morning and was immediately approved by the other members.

Abolish Easy Jobs. Then Senator Reed announced that the committee on employees would attempt to abolish some of the easy jobs and to save as much money for the state as possible. He said that one clerical position and three or four custodial positions could just as well be dispensed with and their duties transferred to other employees of the senate.

Places Were Filled. Senator Reed then followed his announcement up by stating that all of the positions, with the exception of a clerical job and several stenographic places, had been filled and no more employees would be needed. Those already employed would be retained only so long as they gave satisfactory service. Reed's statement brought Hoagland to his feet with a protest.

"I'm going to insist that enough stenographers be employed to handle the correspondence and business of this senate properly," the North Platte senator said. "The state is entitled in asking a senator to perform clerical work."

Senator B. K. Bushee followed Hoagland with assurances that the committee on employees did not intend to restrict any necessary employees.

No Pay Boost. "We do object, however, to having reductions come in during the middle of this session or towards the tail end, to boost salaries. Every employee necessary to carry on the business of the senate will be employed, but we do not propose to have salary boosts run in on us."

Senator Cooper of Omaha contributed to the debate with some rather pointed remarks. "I would like to submit a few proposals for employees," Cooper said, replying to a statement made by Reed that he would like to have members turn in their applications for employment to him.

Gannon Has Friends. Benjamin Gannon closed the debate by observing that he represented three or four of the largest counties in the state and he had run ahead of the republican ticket in his territory. He had three or four applications he thought were deserving of attention.

After disposing of the employees' matter, the senate recessed to meet with the house in joint session to canvass the vote.

The were indications that the senate might overrule Senator Reed in his employees' program.

Defendant in Murder Causes Big Sensation By Kissing Widow

Chicago Tribune-Omaha Bee Leased Wire. Bridgeport, Conn., Jan. 5.—Panic gripped the crowd at the George B. Nott murder trial here today, when Elwood G. Wade, 23, milk peddler on trial for Nott's murder, leaned over as he was passing Mrs. Ethel Hutchinson Nott, wife of the murdered man, and kissed her full on the lips.

With a scream, Mrs. Nott staggered from her seat, just as Deputy Sheriff Frank Pasanella landed with his fist on young Wade's jaw.

Wade's pretty young wife, sitting a few feet from Mrs. Nott, the "other woman in the case," screamed as she witnessed her husband's action, threw her hands to her face, and then with a moan, fainted into the arms of Wade's mother and another woman friend.

Mrs. Nott, who is also held on a charge of first degree murder in connection with her husband's death, went into hysterics following Wade's kiss.

"Take her out—" yelled the crowd. Two deputy sheriffs rushed her from the court room. It was the second time during the day that the wife of the murdered man had been carried from the court room.

Two Unidentified Men Killed by Explosion

Williamson, W. Va., Jan. 5.—Two unidentified men were killed in a dynamite explosion near the mine of the Crystal Block Mining company at Gates, 10 miles from Williamson, last night, according to information received by the Williamson Coal Operators' association.

The bodies were found near the boarding house of 30 negro employees of the Crystal Block mine, and a large hole in the ground bore evidence of the explosion. Information available was that the president and secretary of the local miners' union in the region were reported missing. Strike headquarters could not verify the report.
