



Abolish Easy Jobs. Then Senator Reed announced that the 'committee on employes would attempt to abolish some of the easy jobs and to save as much money for the state as possible. He said that one clerical position and three or four custodial positions could just as well be dispensed with and their duties transferred to other

employes of the senate. Mr. Reed said there would be no attempt to reduce the stenographic force, inasmuch as a majority of the members had a voluminous correspondence with their constituency and every effort would be made to see that it was handled expeditiously. He thought, however, that no senator should use the time of stenographers to type private letters not connected with the state's busi-

Places Were Filled. Senator Reed then followed hi senator Reed then followed his announcement up by stating that all of the positions, with the exception of a clerical job and several stenographic places, had been filled and no more employes would be needed. Those already employed would be retained only so long as they gave satisfactory service. Reed's statement brought Hoagland to his feet with a protest.
