London Welcomes Mrs. Catt

Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, who is in London, spoke recently at a meeting convened in the Central Hall, Westminster, under the auspices of the National Union of Societies for Equal Citizenship and other women's associations. Newspaper accounts say that a hearty welcome and congratulations were offered Mrs. Catt on the suffrage victory in America.

Mrs. Catt pointed out that England and America in the matter of justice to women had traveled along parallel lines; if America won a victory, England went ahead. At present America was a step in advance, she said, for they had the suffrage on the same terms as men, with no age limit. She felt sure that England would not long lag behind in this matter. The audience listened intently, according to reports, while the speaker gave an illuminating description of the organization of the campaign in America. New York, the most difficult constituency (where 42 different languages and dialects are spoken) was attacked first, and the details of the work which had to be done, and was done with devotion, patience and determination, showed that brains of a high order as well as burning enthusiasm contributed to the well-earned victory.

The presence of women in New York politics, said Mrs. Catt, has revolutionized election day. The vote is gained, and now it is a question of using it wisely. We want statesmen to take the place of the politicians, said the speaker in ringing tones. Her final appeal to the newly enfranchised was, "Keep your eyes on the big things."
