Dr. Hartley Burr Alexander, University of Nebraska, Lincoln, will speak in Omaha under auspices of the Omaha School Forum on Mondays, beginning January 17, duplicate lectures at 4 and 8 o'clock, in the council chamber of the city hall. Fifteen lectures under the subject, "Democratic Ideals" will comprise the course.

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Glee Club Presents Minnesota Singers

The Boys' and Girls' Glee club of Central High school will present the Hamline University Glee club of St. Paul, Minn., in a concert January 11 at 8 p. m., at the Central High school auditorium.

The object of the concert, according to Carol M. Pitts, director of music at the school, is to create a love for good music in the school.

The St. Paul Pioneer Press Sunday, November 28 last, said of this musical organization:

"For the last 36 years the Hamline University club has made an annual concert tour in the fall, and it has been long considered one of the best amateur musical organizations in the northwest. The club this year is composed of 17 voices, including Prof. John A. Jaeger, who has directed the Hamline songsters for seven years.

"As the majority of the members of the club have sung together for the last year or more, their director

announces that the ensemble singing will be of a very high order. The same quartet that was identified with the club last year will again be heard with but one change, Lorille Boylen, freshman, is the new second tenor.

"The Hamlineites have a plentiful supply of soloist material, which should do much to make their entertainment pleasing. Lloyd Sundin, baritone, is the soloist in the First Baptist church choir, Minneapolis. Fred Frankson, tenor soloist and reader, was the first tenor in the Chicago preachers' quartet in 1919. At the close of its season's tour the quartet sang for several phonograph records.

"Malcolm Farley, flute soloist, will accompany the singers on their tour. Mr. Farley played flute at the Champs Elysee theater, Paris, during the presentation of the musical comedy, "Let's Go," before Premier Clemenceau and General Pershing. An informal reception will be held following the performance, when

members of the audience may meet the singers. Members of the High School Glee club will entertain the visitors at their homes. Among the Omaha boys who will have guests are Hubert Williams, Gerrit Johnson, Ed Samuelson, Lloyd Good, Kenneth Seely, and Donald Myers.

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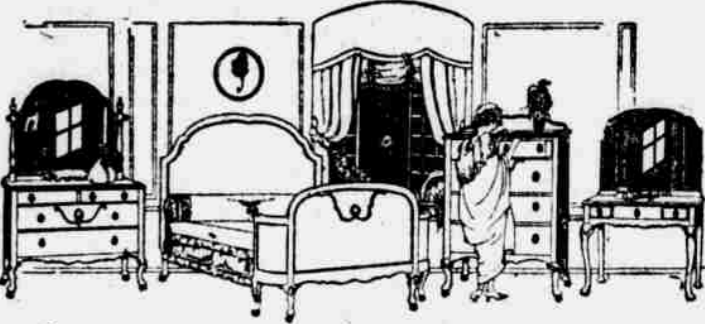
