

Judge Revokes Parole and Sends Man Back to Pen

Former Prisoner, Sentenced For Theft of Auto Tires, Arrested After Violating Terms of Release.

Farnam Djureen was ordered returned to the penitentiary yesterday afternoon by District Judge Day for violation of his parole.

Djureen was sentenced last summer to the penitentiary for one to seven years for grand larceny involving theft of automobile tires. He was paroled at Blair right after the sentence by District Judge L. B. Day, not, however, on recommendation of County Attorney Grace Ballard of Washington county, as has been published.

Early this week he was picked up by police in a North Sixteenth street soft drink parlor. Brought before Judge Day, he explained his presence there by saying he just "went there to return a pair of cuff links to a man." He had been expressly prohibited at the time of his parole from visiting North Sixteenth street places.

Djureen and his wife were living in apartments costing \$40 a month, but he could not show the court how he earned the money to pay the rent.

New York Man Urges Early Settlement of German Indemnity

Chicago, Jan. 14.—An early settlement of the German indemnity question is necessary as a preliminary to a turn for the better in European business conditions, Gerhard M. Dahl, New York banker, said in an address before the Illinois Bankers' association. The condition of European business, he said, was the most important single factor in America's domestic situation. "Our business fortunes are in a large measure tied up with those of Europe," said Mr. Dahl. "Our industrial life depends upon a balanced world equilibrium. It is necessary that Europe should make internal readjustment of a political and financial nature, before her industries really can get on their feet."

40-Mile Federal Aid Road for Otoe County

Nebraska City, Neb., Jan. 14.—(Special.)—The federal aid road from Eagle, in Cass county, to pass through Palmyra, Unadilla, Syracuse and Dunbar to Nebraska City, where it will connect with the Kansas City-Omaha federal aid highway, has been accepted by the state highway department. The commission of Otoe county and Herbert Schwaderer, road engineer, met with State Engineer Metrick at Palmyra and went over the project carefully, and a contract for grading will probably be let next month. The project is approximately 40 miles long and runs east and west through Otoe county.

Railway Reduces Force

Toledo, Jan. 14.—One hundred and fifty men employed in the shops of the New York Central Railway company were thrown out of work when the company put into effect, a lay-off which reduces the working forces in all shops here to about 55 per cent of normalcy, it was announced by officials.

Col. P. C. Heafey Dies After Long Illness

Col. P. C. Heafey, charity worker and leader in Irish circles of the city, died early yesterday morning at his home, 125 South Thirty-fifth street, after a lingering illness. Colonel Heafey gained distinction when appointed to serve on the reception committee for Cardinal Vanuetelli, papal delegate from Rome, on a visit to this country in 1910. He was a charter member of the Knights of Columbus, a life member of the Elks and at one time was treasurer of 11 different societies. At the time of his death he was a member of numerous Omaha clubs.

Attempt Is Made to Reach Agreement in Raisin Company Case

Los Angeles, Jan. 14.—A conference at which an attempt was to be made to reach an agreement under which the government would withdraw its suit against the California Associated Raisin company of Fresno, charging violation of the Sherman anti-trust act, was begun here in the chambers of Judge H. F. Bledsoe of the United States district court.

Resides Judge Bledsoe, John H. Atwood, special assistant to the attorney general, and attorneys representing the defendant corporation and independent raisin growers were present.

The chief point to be considered, it was said, was how to permit the corporation to continue in business and at the same time eliminate monopolistic features of which the government complained.

Bandit Overlooks \$60,000 In Raid on Colorado Bank

Denver, Jan. 14.—An armed bandit, shortly after noon today, entered the State Bank of Littleton, at Littleton, near Denver, held up the cashier, William Teller, and escaped with \$2,000 in an automobile driven by an accomplice. Reports said the bandits headed for Denver and the Denver police sent a riot squad in an automobile to meet them. The bandit overlooked \$60,000.
