Beneath the above verse and a design which was done by hand with berry juices, are the words in Mar-greta's own handwriting, "Written the thirtieth of October in the year of our Lord Jesus Christ, 1812." A product of the Pennsylvania Dutch was this plate. "The song book for which the plate was made, said Maurice Block, art director, is speculating on the attractive piece of work, "was probably the only book Margreta Meyer had. No doubt it meant everything in the world to

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
