Statement Says Living Costs Have Increased 93 Per Cent, While Wages Have Been Raised But 70 Per Cent.

Chicago, Jan. 21.-In a statement made public today by the Chicago building trades council, reasons are set forth why the 32 affiliated unions voted not to accept wage reductions within the next three years. It was decided at a meeting of agents yeserday to insist on continuation of he present scale of \$1.25 an hour.

The statement cites government figures showing the cost of living in Chicago has increased 93.3 per cent over 1914 and asserts the increase in building trade wages here in the same period has been from 66 to 70

per cent.
