"And, whereas, after full discussion of the pressure and the hearing of arguments made by R. B. Howell of the Water board and J. E. Davidson of the Nebraska Power Co., the legislation and taxation committee of the board recorded a vote of 5 to 2 opposed to the pas-sage of house roll No. 1;

"And, whereas, the full membership of the board, after open discussion and weighing of the arguments pro and con, advanced by R. B. Howell of the Water board and by J. A. C. Kennedy, attorney of the Nebraska Power Co., has, through referendum, voted 46 to 21 against the passage of house bill No. 1;

"Now, therefore, at a joint meeting of the board of directors, and the legislative committee of the Omaha Real Estate board, held this 28th day of January, 1921, it is re-solved that each of the senators and representatives from Douglas county in the legislature be apprised of this action and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to each

"Resolved, further, that the board's opposition to house roll No. 1 is without prejudice in reference to the matter of the proposed in-crease in rates by the Nebraska Power Co., but that it is the sense of this body that no advance should be allowed by the commissioners of the city of Omaha, unless it is proven conclusively to their satisfaction that the present rates are inadequate to allow a fair return on the actual value of the property, without regard to the amount of capitalization, and that a copy of these resolutions be delivered to
