

Pardons Applied For by Douglas County Convicts

Many Prisoners Sentenced for Heinous Crimes Ask Release—Persons Opposed Should Notify Parole Board.

Applications of convicts for parole from the state penitentiary will be heard before the state board of pardons next Tuesday. There are 19 applications from convicts sent up from Douglas county, 18 from men and one from a woman.

County Attorney Shotwell advises that persons opposed to granting paroles to the applicants should communicate at once with the pardon board.

Many convicted of heinous crimes are requesting pardons. County Attorney Shotwell said. The Douglas county applicants are:

Joseph L. O'Hare, convicted on January 16, 1920, of attempted assault upon a young girl; Fletcher Cloud, negro, found guilty on January 4, 1920, of an attempted assault upon a white woman; Harry S. McKay, insurance man, found guilty of having four wives; R. T. Ritchie, Robert Harvey, Dewey Woodman and Joseph Turner, all sentenced for highway robbery; William A. Fouse, sentenced for life for first degree murder; Frank B. Clayton, Michael J. Randall and Raymond Lane, for larceny; Abbie Hailey, grand larceny; James Wilson, forgery; Joe Bitterman, larceny; D. C. Slaughter, for issuing checks with insufficient funds in bank; Edward Downey, for breaking and entering; and Carson B. Covington, breaking and entering.
