The adoption of a resolution, which gave endorsement to birth control and to the movement which seeks to have laws restricting access to scientific knowledge on this subject repealed, was one of the outstanding features of the 26th annual convention of New York State Federation of Women's Clubs, held at Utica, where over 700 clubwomen, including officers, directors, delegates and alternates participated.

The resolution brought about the most heated debate of the convention. Other resolutions approved dealt with uniform laws regarding marriage and divorce, ordinances regulating billboard advertising, the national movement for recruiting student nurses and Armenian relief.

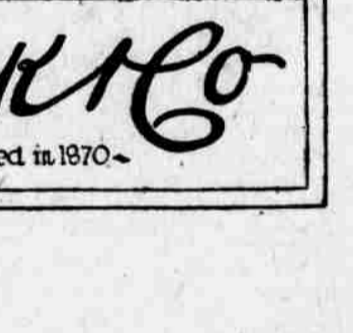
