Wage War Looms Between Unions **And Contractors**

Some Members of Builders' Exchange Believe Pay Should Be Cut; Laborers Say Expenses Still High.

An interesting wate situation looms between the Omaha Builders' exchange, composed of contractors, and the Building Trades

It has been customary to agree on wage scales for a period of one year, on April 1 of each year. Some contractors are now contending that wages should be reduced for the coming year, whereas the union men contend there has been no material reduction in the cost of living and there should be no cut in wages, although they assert they are open to conviction.
It is understood that union build-

ing workers will not ask for an advance over the wages of last year and it is the opinion of the contractors that they are not willing to pay any fixed scale of wages for period of one year, as they have done heretofore.

Carpenters and bricklayers are now negotiating with the Builders' exchange on wage scales. The brick-layers have taken a firm stand against reduction of the scale of \$1.25 an hour.


