To keep up the interest in track among the beginners, Coach Schulte has arranged a system of awarding numerals and holding special meets for novices. Entries for the novice meets include all freshmen, who are ineligible to participate in inter-college meets, and upper-classmen who have not already won letters in

The system of awarding numerals rather elaborate one which makes it possible for promising athletes to win the honor. The athletes instead of racing against competition run against time or re this means, Coach Schulte is able to pick out all who are proficient in any event no matter how many men are showing

Interest in Track Increasing.

Interest in track is increasing here . 100 men are out for the winter training, working on the board oval and straight a-way. 
