Scholarship Winner



OLGA EITNER

A former Omaha musician who is rapidly mounting the ladder of success is Miss Olga Eitner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Eitner of Ottawa, Kan. Miss Eitner appeared in Omaha many times and will be remembered as a violinist of more than usual ability. She remained in Omaha until the fall of 1919, when she entered upon a concert tour of the middle west. Her family left Omaha some three or four years ago. Miss Eitner won the violin honors in the Nebraska state contest of the National Federation of Musical Clubs at Lincoln in November, 1916.

During the month of January Miss Eitner, formerly a pupil of J. E. Brill of this city, entered a national contest conducted by the violinists, Kubelick and Sevcik, at Ithaca, N. Y. There were more than 2,000 applicants, of whom 50 were selected to compete for the scholarship. Among these were pupils of Leopold Auer who taught Jascha Heifetz. From the 50 young players seven were chosen for the final hearing before the artist judges, Kubelick and Sevcik. Only two of the seven were girls. The result of the contest was that a young man by the name of Monaschewitch won the coveted scholarship. A few days ago Mr. Brill received a personal letter from Sevcik in which the latter paid a nice tribute to both the teacher and the pupil. The original and the translation are as follows:

Sauces to Use With Fish. Bernaise Sauce. One and a half teaspoonsful of finely chopped onion, two tablespoonsful vinegar, one-quarter teaspoonful salt, one-eighth teaspoonful paprika, three egg yolks, one tablespoonful chopped parsley. Cook the onions in the vinegar. Place in double boiler and add the egg yolks and seasoning. Cook until the mixture becomes creamy. Capers Sauce. Two tablespoonsful butter, two tablespoonsful flour, one-quarter teaspoonful salt, one-half teaspoonful onion juice, one cup boiling water, four tablespoonsful capers, one tablespoonful vinegar. Make a sauce of the first five ingredients. Just before removing from the fire add the capers and vinegar.
