HealthWeek Opens Auspiciously at Y. W. C. A.

Health week at the Y. W. C. A. opened with a filled auditorium Monday night when Dr. Palmer Findley spoke on the cancer problem. His talk was illustrated with slides.

"There were 90,000 deaths from cancer last year in this country," said the speaker, "and the disease is increasing at the rate of 2 1/2 per cent per year. One woman in eight dies of cancer and one man in 13."

"I bring a message of hope," announced the doctor. "Cancer may be cured in the early stages. It never develops on normal tissue. An irritation that does not heal should be regarded with suspicion. Ignorance and fear prevent many people from consulting a competent authority. A cancer is not painful until it is too late to stop its growth. It is not hereditary. It is not a blood disease, and therein lies the hope that we may get it while it is localized."

"A jump of any kind in the breast is evidence of cancer. Persistent indigestion after the age of 40 is another danger signal," according to Dr. Findley. The next lecture of Health week will be given Wednesday evening at 7:30 at the Y. W. C. A. auditorium by Dr. Robert D. Shrock on "The Effects of Proper Posture on General Health." "Tuberculosis" is the subject for Thursday evening and "The Art and Science of Health Building" Friday evening. All girls and women of the city are invited to attend.

Handy Sewing Bag. A gift which is always much appreciated by some one who has a lot of sewing, knitting and mending to do is a sewing bag, which can be slipped on the arm. These bags are particularly handy for knitters, as they hold all the yarn, instead of rolling about the floor.

To make a bag like this, join up a bright length of cretonne into a nice roomy shape, broad rather than long. Leave both sides unjoined until you have finished the top of the bag and hem them neatly.
