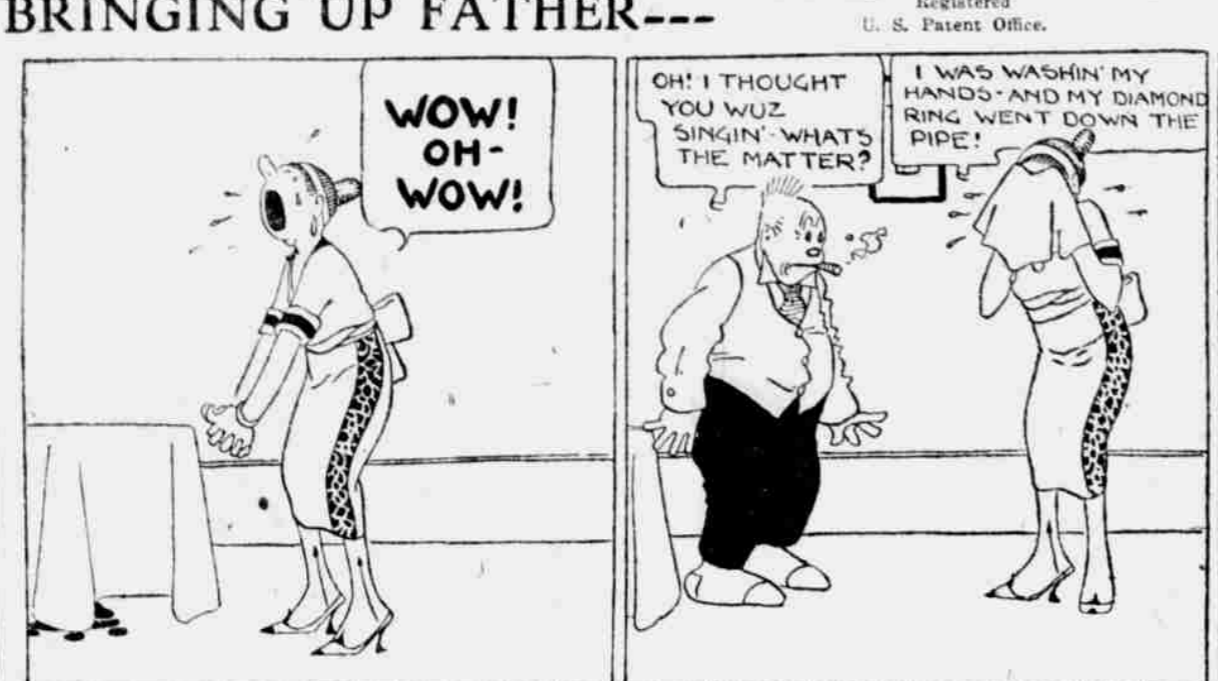

66th Congress Passes Quietly Into History. Little of Usual Flurry Attendant to Inauguration Prevalent at Closing of House and Senate.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 4.—The 66th congress passed peacefully into history today with little of the flurry usually attendant to the hurly-burly of an inauguration.

Final gavel fell in the house at 11:50 o'clock and in the senate about 12:30. Immediately the new senate was called to order by Vice President Coolidge for the session requested by President Harding.

The final sessions were virtually devoid of legislation. The principal bills which failed were the army and navy appropriation bills, and the immigration extension bill. The army and immigration measures met a "pocket" veto by President Wilson and the naval bill failed in the senate.

President Wilson, in conformance with custom, waited upon congress in its final hour in the house and senate chamber, signing a few last-minute measures. Among these were the sundry civil appropriation bill and the Langley bill appropriating \$18,600,000 for hospitalization of former service men.

Plan Substitutes. Republican leaders plan to draft substitutes for the army and navy bills as soon as the extra session is convened by President Harding and rush them through. The immigration restriction measure also will be one of the first measures considered.

In addition to the army and immigration bills, President Wilson pocketed the Wilson bill, amending the war risk insurance act and a private bill.

Little success marked the day's final proceedings and it was a tame finale in comparison with past congresses. Wearied by many night sessions, the customary turbulence of adjournment was absent. But there were many touching incidents in the retirement to private life of many seasoned veterans.

Swearing in of 32 senators was the first business of the new senate, which is expected to continue its session through next week and then adjourn until the extra session of the congress is called in June.

Senator Norbeck of South Dakota, failed to respond to his name today.

New Senate Assembles. After the ceremonies attendant on the inauguration of President Harding had ended, the new senate again assembled, received personally from the new chief executive his cabinet appointments and confirmed their names.

The greatly increased republican majority in the senate compelled a rearrangement of seating. A dozen republicans were assigned to seats across the aisle in the democratic section, thereby re-establishing the old "Coke and stripe" arrangement.

Statements regarding appropriations showed a total appropriation during the congress, of about \$8,400,000 of which about \$3,500,000 was carried in the new session. In the house, the republican claim the money records, the republicans claimed more economies, the saving of \$3,000,000, according to Representative Mondell, republican floor leader, but the democrats asserted no real economy had been achieved.

Several Bills Killed. Prominent among measures which died were the Knox peace resolution, the soldier's bonus bill, the Calder coal regulation bill, and the nacker control bill. The bill for government regulation of coal storage also died in the house.

Other important measures which failed included those providing for establishment of a budget system, for reorganization of the patent office, for co-operative marketing by farmers by exempting them from the anti-trust laws, for an appropriation of \$100,000,000 for federal good roads aid, to stop loans to the allies, to prohibit future trading in foodstuffs, to prohibit strikes on railroads and other common carriers, for civil service reform, for creation of a department of education, for infant and maternity aid, for abolition of the impeachment procedure of Representative Welch, democratic Ohio, against Federal Judge Landis; for punishment of commercial bribery, for general amnesty to persons convicted under the espionage laws, to prohibit "cost plus" government contracts, for Philippine independence and to extend prohibition to the Philippines and for repeal of the railroad physical valuation law.

Several thousand nominations submitted by President Wilson, including about 1,500 postmasters, 11 majors and 22 brigadier generals, were left to die in the senate. All unacted bills must be re-introduced and re-considered anew in the next congress in order to reach the statutory goal. Most of them will be, according to past records.

Bootlegger Leaves \$400,000 Estate. New York, March 4.—Profits in "boot-legging" are indicated in the police locating checks, bank books and other papers of Alberto Alteria, who was slain February 10 near police headquarters, probably by boot-leggers, was worth about \$300,000 and \$400,000.

His wife, Josephine Alteria, 21, was located today with her 5-month-old baby. She was living on the bounty of relatives in a 32nd street tenement.

The district attorney's office issued a subpoena for Mrs. Alteria to call and be acquainted with the fact that the police got estate records.
