"Judge Landis is reputed to be a man who does his duty as he sees it. More power to him. But he cannot do his duty when he does not see it. By this I mean it will be almost impossible to shadow all the players who would not be immune to a 'psek under the pil.ow.'

"Gamblers have shown a marked interest in base ball and Judge Landis or a dozen like him could not keen gamblers out of base ball unless they were willing to be kept out. There are too many of them, and too many methods of reaching players. Gamblers killed horse racing and apparently have done the same to professional base ball.






