

The stories given by the Unkel brothers are consistent and their versions of the poker game, the fight and the shooting affray seem to coincide. Cross-examination was long and drawn out, in the attempt to get a contradiction of testimony. Those implicated in the poker game and shooting party are the Unkel brothers, John Litz, Merle Brunner, Fritz Radigan, Homer Brown, Glen Freeman, besides Dunkel and Wick-

The testimony given by the Unkles stated that Wickersham was shot by Dunkle, while the former was trying

to escape.

The first brawl began when Dunkleylost with three aces to Wickersham's pat flush. The Unkels claimed that Brunner, another player, attempted to draw out his bet and Dunkle objected. Three men were engaged in a fight with Dunkle as a result, and in the melee John Litz escaped to return with a shotgun, it was said.
