Attorney General Palmer last December decided the wholesaler had no legal right to continue in business, internal revenue and prohibition officials decided to grant some time to unload stocks. But Mr. Kramer' announcement made it clear there would be no further extension of

Mr. Kramer, however, opened the way for retail druggists to obtain supplies for prescriptions, removing the ban on withdrawals from bonded warehouses.

The order makes it possible for retail druggists to transact business direct with the bonded warehouses. Wholesale druggists will be taken care of later, Mr. Kramer indicated, y granting them similar privileges.

Dealing between retail draggists and other purchasers and the bonded warehouses later will be limited by regulations which officials declared would be drastic enough to satisfy the most ardent dry advocate. They must be based, however, it was added, on Mr. Palmer's opinion.

So far as the wholesalers are concerned, Mr. Kramer said the task is to get rid of the stocks. They will not be allowed to increase holdings, but there are no strings to selling to druggists before May 15. Officials authounced no figures concerned the amount of liquor held by wholesalers, but said they believe the stock largely would be disposed.



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
