S. Davies Warfield of Baltimore, who represents the great body of stockholders in American railroads, Senator Albert B. Cummins of Iowa, an authority without superior upon the railroad situation in the United States, and Vice President William W. Atterbury of the Pennsylvania Railroad company, conspicuously represent the emergencies and serious difficulties which characterize American railroads today, Acting independently and yet in full sympathy one with another, they are laboring to bring forth order out of

something like chaos. There is, it is true, one assuring feature in the railroad situation. That was the enacting into law of the so called Winslow-Townsend which became a law in the last week of President Wilson's administration. But the railroads of the United States are debtors to the people by as much as \$13,000,-000,000, for investors of the country hold bonds to that amount.
