At the last named city, he will board an Italian destroyer for Barcelona, where he will be the guest of Archduke Leopold Salvator.



Irma told newspaper men that Higgins then discussed the name of another man with her sister. Shoes belonging to Higgins and which he admits he wore Wednesday, were fitted into the foot prints found near the spot where Lucy's body was found. 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
