

Los Angeles, April 4.—Charles Paddock, University of Southern California sprint king, who just broke the world's record for the 220yard dash, explained today how he managed to become the "speediest man on the face of the earth."

"There is no secret to it," he said. 'My success is attributable to good condition and a powerful leg drive. "I run with my legs ahead of me,

The faster they try to go, the more they tilt themselves, and consequently they lose their driving power."
